Guam Protests Annexation Bid By Hawaii's Fong

Guam's representative in Washington yesterday criticized a proposal hy Sen. Hiram L. Fong (R-Hawaii) that Hawaii annex Guam. Samoa, and the trust territories in the Western Pacific.

Rep. Antonio B. Won Pat said: "This proposal would simply mean the substitution of one form of absentee government for another. Hawaii is too far from Guam and the other Western Pacific islands to provide them with the form of democratic government they are seeking."

The Guam representative called for incorporating Guam with the Marianas, Caroline, and Marshall islands, now administered by the United States under a United Nations trust. Under this plan, the new territory would have its apitale at Mgane, Guam.
