5 Get Terms Up to 5 Years In Israeli Nurse Rape Case

Five men were sentenced yesterday to indeterminate terms up to five years in the rape of an Israeli nurse last October. Justice Albert H. Bosch recommended in Queens Supreme Court the five be made to serve maximum terms.

They pleaded guilty to the reduced charge of attempted rape last March 25. The police said the 28-year-old Israeli citizen, whose name has never been made public, agreed to the lesser charge. They hinted she did not want to go through the ordeal of a court trial.

The five are Thomas Alston, 18, years old; Howard Garrett, 20; Isaac Harris, 19; Edward J. Mason Jr., 22, and Dennis Ahriston, 24, all of Queens. The police said they pulled the nurse into their car on Welfare Island, dragged her into an empty apartment, raped her repeatedly, then dumped her from the car in Queens.

Co-ed Editor Not to Go Before Grand Jury Again

EUGENE, Ore., June 30 (AP)—District Attorney Robert Frye said today he would not again try to force Annette Buchanan, University of Oregon student editor, to disclose the names of news sources.

Earlier, Mr. Frye had said he was thinking about taking the 20-year-old girl before a grand jury and again asking her to disclose the names of the students she interviewed for a story on marijuana users.

She was convicted of contempt of court for refusing earlier to obey a court order to give the grand jury the names. She was fined \$300.

Miss Buchanan has until July 11 to decide whether to appeal the case to the Oregon Supreme Court or to ask for a new trial.

MADRID, June 30—Four labor leaders were arraigned in court here today on charges of illegal activities following Monday's scheduled demonstration by workers during which the police arrested 182 people.

While the others have been released, the four labor leaders, including the editor of a Roman Catholic labor publication, face charges involving their membership in a workers' commission that sought to present a petition to the Government.

The demonstrator, in front of the Labor Ministry, had been called by the workers' commissions, which are technically illegal leadership groups within the unions controlled by the regime, to demand trade-union freedoms and economic improvement, including the quadrupling of the official minimum daily wage, equivalent to \$1.

The rally never materialized because the Government sent about 1,000 policemen on foot, on horseback and in jeeps to prevent it.

The Government had charged that the demonstration was Marxist-inspired.

The four labor leaders are Ceferino Maetzu, editor of the news agency Fiel, and a former official of the Young Falangists' movement; Victor Martinez Conde, editor of Mas, a publication of the Roman Catholic workers' brotherhood; José Hernández Sánchez, Chairman of the workers' commission in the graphic arts union, and Manuel Camacho Abad, union chief at the Hispania-Perkins diesel engines works here.

Russians Call on U.S. to Set U.N. Deadline on Pacific Isles

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., June 30—The Soviet Union called on the Trusteeship Council today to set a deadline for the United States to grant independence to the Pacific islands it holds as a trust territory.

Nikolai R. Makarevich said his Government hoped the United States would soon present a detailed report on progress toward independence but that meanwhile he proposed that the Council set a definite date.

Mr. Makarevich's speech during the Council's periodic review, was relatively mild, though he repeated Soviet accusations that the United States was treating the islands as a colonial military base and doing little for the people.
