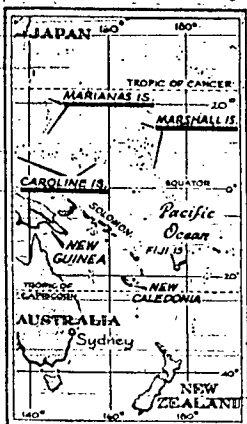
Johnson Asks Pacific Trust Study

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21—President Johnson asked Congress today to establish a commission to consider the future status of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.

The trust territory consists of the Marianas Islands (except for Guam, which is a United States territory), the Caroline Islands and the Marshall Islands in the Western Pacific. There are 2,141 islands, in all populated by 92,373 persons, as of 1966.

The United States administers the trust territory under a United Nations mandate of 1947.

The commission recommended by the President would study the desirability of calling a plebiscite before 1972 to permit the Micronesians, as the islanders are known, to decide their governmental future.

U.S. WEIGHS SENDING TEAM TO VIEW VOTE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—The White House is considering what might be done to comply with a request of the South Vietnamese Government that the United States send observers to the Vietnamese election Sept. 3, George Christian, the press secretary, said today.

No decision has been reached, he said, on how many persons might make up a team or on how disinterested observers might be selected.

The Columbus (Ohio) Dispatch quoted unidentified Washington sources as having said that President Johnson was nearing a decision on sending a team of observers to the election.

The newspaper said that these sources had said there were indications that either

Gov. James A. Rhodes of Ohio, or Charles P. Taft, head of the United States Fair Elections Commission, might be named to the team.

Linowitz Calls Red Parley No Threat to Hemisphere

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 21 (Reuters)—Sol M. Linowitz, the United States delegate to the Organization of American States, said tonight that a recent conference in Havana calling for more "Vietnams" in Latin America posed no long-range threat to the hemisphere.

He said at the annual dinner of the American Chamber of Commerce of Mexico that the Havana conference of the Organization of Latin American Solidarity had "encouraged hatred and distortions among those who should know better and among those who, regretably, are not being given the chance to know better."

2 War Critics Convicted Of Defying Fort Sill Chief

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 21 (AP)—A Federal court jury, deliberating 12 minutes tonight, found two antiwar workers guilty of violating a commanding general's order not to enter the Fort Sill Military Reservation near Lawton, Okla.

The two, Maryann Weissman and Key Martin, will be sentenced Friday. The maximum penalty is a six-month jail sentence and \$500 fine.

Mrs. Weissman, 29 years old, and Martin, 24, both avowed opponents of the Vietnam war, had gone to Fort Sill to attend three courts-martial on July 31. Maj. Gen. Charles Brown, Fort Sill's commanding officer, had issued an order July 29 barring the two from the post.

Both are members of Youth Against War and Fascism.

Car Thief Flees in Subway After Gun Battle in Midtown

Two detectives fired six shots in midtown Manhattan last night while chasing a car thief who twice struck a city bus, drove the wrong way on Fifth Avenue, abandoned the car at 45th Street and Sixth Avenue and escaped by running up the BMT subway tracks.

According to the police, a garage employe Arthur Taylor, observed the theft and followed in his own car. Alerted by him, two detectives joined the chase on foot at 46th Street and Fifth Avenue. When the driver, who had stopped for a red light, Detective Patrick Goggins fired a shot, the police said.

The car struck a Fifth Avenue bus in the rear, then spun around and struck the bus in the front, as Detective Goggins and his partner, Detective Carl LaLema, fired three more shots. The suspect drove west on 45th Street in heavy traffic, with the detectives following on foot. When they fired two more shots, the driver left the car and ran down Sixth Avenue.
