

Dear Mr. Norwood,

We the undersigned urge you to reconsider your position on the Eminent Domain Bill, passed by the Congress last summer and vetoed by you. In the last few months dissatisfaction with the land issue, as expressed by the legislatures of Palau, Saipan and the Marshall's, as well as by the sixty Micronesian students at the University of Hawaii, warrants, we believe, a re-evaluation of the present law. From our experience in Palau we know that land is the people's most precious possession, and that the Congress, as their representative body, should have equal say with the High Commissioner in the allotment of public land.

With the new session of Congress opening we ask you to consult with the Congressmen, and act accordingly.
