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Attached is a summary of our basic policy rationale on the political future of the Trust Territory as it appeared at the change in Administrations. Since then we have learned belatedly--via an appallingly bad reporting system--that the political climate in the Territory is even more disturbing than we had characterized it. Neiman Craley, who admittedly tends to be a prophet of doom, is one source of our anxiety but there is ample corroborating evidence in the activities of the Congress of Micronesia's Status Commission and the almost incredible resolutions being passed by various legislatures in the TTPI.

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Unquestionably many--perhaps most--of these sophisticated Micronesians have not set their hearts on such a radical change of course and are using these concepts to push us off dead center. In the process, however, they are running great risks of committing themselves irretrievably.

There is an immediate aspect of a generally urgent problem. In large part as a result of our inability to get our Congress to establish the US Status Commission, the Micronesian counterpart has become an unguided missile

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moving increasingly in the direction of favoring independence or New Zealand-style Pacific arrangements, involving the loosest form of association. Their final report is due in July 1969 and they do not wish to delay it further or to come to Washington for a dose of official indoctrination. Unbeknownst to the State Department, they asked the High Commissioner in January to give them a local briefing on US Government views and in view of our unpreparedness at that time have given us a reprieve until April or possibly May. If some sort of authoritative interim message cannot be given them by that time we may be in an extraordinarily awkward position.

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
