Department & BOB ham tried to help

- 1965 Budget Bureau and Office of Budget made detailed evaluation of planning, programming & budgetary deficiencies
- 1966 Tried to get TT to utilize PPB concepts. Sent Mr. Hughes to TT for one month to assist in developing a program planning approach and the 1968 Program Memorandum
- 1967 TT did not pick up the planning. Submission was completely inadequate. Dept. finally had to send a task force to TT for two weeks to try to develop a program plan
- 1968 Same problems continued. Held training sessions. Dept.
 established broad objectives and goals. Some improvement
 but still grossly inadequate. TT rejected use of available census and other data.

1969 - Dept. and OT jointly developed basic planning models. TT staff rejected. Declined using information that was available

Examples of Problems

We don't really know what our objectives and goals are

Have not had planning capability

Have not made full use of what we have. Even poor data is better than nothing if it is the best we have. Set forth our plan with appropriate recognition of deficiencies.

Attitude and communication has been poor

Actual performance has been poor. Creditability problems within Dept., BOB and Congress

We don't seem to be reaching the people - have not focused on achieving maximum benefit to the greatest number of people

Congress is greatly dissatisfied with our progress and staffing (See House Report 1395, 5/16/68)
