Legal Education Proposal for Micronesia

It is indeed encouraging that the Chief Justice of Micronesia has
submitted a request for Peace Corps Volunteers in the area of legal
education. With his support, the Volunteers ought to be able to make
a lasting contribution to the judicial structure in the Trust Territory.

My initial questions - and it is a quies question, not a criticism is whether older retired senior legal personnal are the most appropriate
resource to request. I suppose Justice Schoolcraft is remembering the
service of Judge Clifton, and perhaps also the young, more activitst
lawyers in requested retired judges and law professors. However, I wonder
if these people are willing to go out to the district centers and if they
can adjust their legal of expertese to the needs of the Micronesian districts.
In order to fairly judge the skill and experiental needs of the Micronesian
courts, it would be necessary to have a better and more thorough understanding
of what goes on now. Mel could illuminate this based on his observations.

This program calls for on-the-job training, with the Volunteer responsible

for setting up classes (perhaps this is an argument for older and more

experienced people). The PCVs will also "assist" the judges and law clerks,

and I should think the line between "assist" and "do it yourself" may be thin

indeed.

It is certainly worth themost careful consideration. I believe we need to know more about the job. If we were to go with this, it would certainly call for a special recruiting campaign, which Tom Houser might be willing
