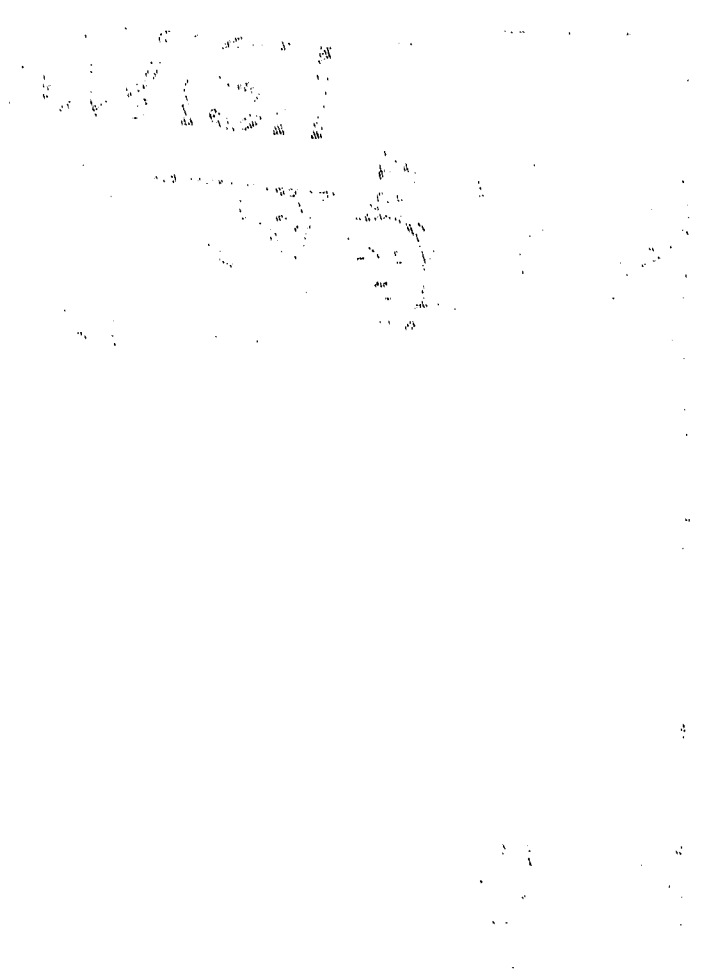


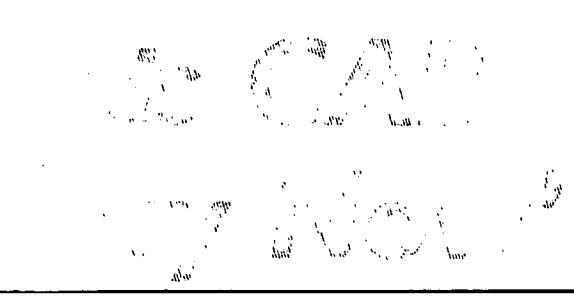

Arrest of Student For Libel

KOROR, Palau, (MNS) - Territorial law enforcement authorities in Palau district have arrested a Micronesian student, Moses Uludong, and charged him with criminal libel and disturbing the peace.

Uludong, a Palauan who attended Chamorro College in Honolulu, Hawaii, was taken into custody Wednesday in Koror, the Palau district center. He was held overnight while the investigation into the charges against him continued. On Thursday, the territorial complaints were filed. Palau District Associate Judge William O. Kelly accepted Uludong's plea of not guilty on both counts and set a trial date for August 10, 1971.

Micronesian News Service has learned that the charges grew out of letters - that Uludong allegedly mailed to various officers of the United States and Palau government. Among other things, the letters reportedly threatened to "sink our American life" in the Trust Territory. Copies of the letters were sent to U.S. representative Wayne L. Hayes of the President Richard Nixon and Palau District Administrator Thomas Kennedy, among others. They also have been mailed from various places including Hawaii, Guam and Palau.

Uludong has been in the

Territory for about two weeks, traveling through the districts and visiting his family in Palau. He is the brother of Francisco Uludong, Editor of the Student newspaper "The Young Micronesian" in Hawaii.
