PONAPE, AUGUST 31 (MNS)---TWO MORE BILLS ARE ON THEIR WAY TO TRUST TERRITORY HIGH COMMISSIONER EDWARD E. JOHNSTON AS THE RESULT OF ACTION THURSDAY (AUGUST 31) BY THE CONGRESS OF MICRONESIA. ONE OF THE MEASURE PROVIDES EMERGENCY FUNDS TO COPE WITH THE POWER CRISIS ON SAIPAN, AND THE OTHER APPROPRIATES SUPPLEMENTARY FUNDS FOR THE OPERATIONS OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON FUTURE STATES.

THE ACTIONS CAME AS BOTH THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONTINUED TO HOLD SPLIT, MORNING AND AFTERNOON SESSIONS IN PONAPE. THERE ARE NOW TWO WORKING DAYS REMAINING IN THE SPECIAL SESSION, WHICH BEGAN ON AUGUST 14 AND IS DUE TO END SOMETIME SATURDAY.

THE FIRST BILL TO PASS CAME DURING THE MORNING SESSION OF THE HOUSE. AFTER A VERY SHORT DISCUSSION, A MEASURE EARMARKING \$200,000 DOLLARS FOR THE PURCHASE OF POWER GENERATING EQUIPMENT ON SAIPAN PASSED (SB 244). A FIRE DESTROYED THE MAIN POWER GENERATING PLANT ON THE TT HEADQUARTERS ISLAND JUST ONE DAY BEFORE THE SPECIAL SESSION BEGAN, AND THE CONGRESSMEN IMMEDIATELY MOVED THROUGH LEGISLATION TO ASSIST IN THE CRISIS. THE BILL IS THE SECOND TO BE SENT TO THE HICOM FROM THIS SESSION.

DURING THE EVENING SESSION OF THE SENATE, BILL NUMBER THREE COMPLETED THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS. BY ACCEPTING A HOUSE AMENDMENT INCREASING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY, THE SENATORS GAVE FINAL APPROVAL TO A BILL THAT ALLOCATES \$115,000 DOLLARS FOR THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON FUTURE STATUS (SB 236).

AS THE END OF THE SPECIAL SESSION NEARS, SEVERAL MAJOR PIECES OF LEGISLATION ARE STILL PENDING. THE SENATE TOOK ACTION

ON ONE OF THEM THURSDAY, VOTING TO PASS ON SECOND READING THE BILL CALLING FOR A MICRONESIAN CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION (SR 231). IF THIS MEASURE ALSO PASSES THE HOUSE, IT WILL PROBABLY BE MARKED AS THE MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENT OF THE SESSION.

AS PASSED BY THE SENATE, THE BILL IS IN QUITE A DIFFERENT FORM FROM ITS ORIGINAL VERSION. BY AMENDMENT, THE SENATE COMMITTEE

ON WAYS AND MEANS MADE SEVERAL CHANGES THAT TENDED TO BRING THE MEASURE MORE IN LINE WITH THE HOUSE VERSION OF THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION BILL. THEY INCREASED THE NUMBER OF DELEGATES TO THE CONVENTION TO 48 FROM 28, AND INCREASED THE APPROPRIATION CALLED FOR TO COVER THE ADDED EXPENSE. THEY ALSO AMENDED THE BILL TO PROVIDE FOR THE DIRECT ELECTION OF THE DELEGATES, TWO FROM EACH REPRESENTATIVE DISTRICT, RATHER THAN ALLOWING THE DISTRICT LEGISLATURES TO MAKE THE DELEGATE SELECTION. SIX DELEGATES WILL STILL BE SELECTED BY THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATIONS, AND FROM EACH.

THE MOST NOTEWORTHY ABOUT THE BILL IS THE FACT THAT THE MARIANA ISLAND DISTRICT IS INCLUDED DESPITE THE TESTIMONY OF MARIANAS MEMBERS OF THE CONGRESS THAT THEY WANTED TO BE EXCLUDED. THE COMMITTEE, ON THE SENATE, VOTED TO GO ALONG WITH LEGAL OPINIONS THAT ONE DISTRICT COULD NOT BE WRITTEN OUT OF THE BILL.

ACCEPTANCE OF THIS PROVISION PROMPTED A FLOOR DEBATE, THE LONGEST OF THE SESSION SO FAR FOR THE SENATE. SENATORS EDWARD PANGELINAN AND OLYMPIO BORJA OF THE MARIANAS RESTATED THEIR REASONS WHY THE MARIANAS THOUGHT IT SHOULD BE EXCLUDED FROM THE TRILL, AND RECEIVED IN RETURN REASSURANCES THAT INCLUSION OF THE MARIANAS WILL NOT IN ANY WAY BIND THE MARIANAS TO THE FUTURE GOVERNMENT OF THE OTHER FIVE DISTRICTS. APPARENTLY, THE MARIANAS CAN STILL SIMPLY REFUSE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION, AND IN THE FINAL ANALYSIS THEY WILL ALSO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO REJECT THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTION.

UNDER TERMS OF THE BILL AS PASSED BY THE SENATE, THE CONVENTION WOULD STILL BE HELD IN PALAU DISTRICT BEGINNING NEXT APRIL AND RUNNING FOR SIXTY DAYS, WITH THE DELEGATES TO BE ELECTED AS PART OF THE REGULAR GENERAL ELECTION FOR MEMBERS OF THE CONGRESS OF MICRONESIA ON NOVEMBER 7, 1972.

IN OTHER ACTION IN THE SENATE THURSDAY, FIVE MORE BILLS WERE GIVEN FINAL PASSAGE AND SENT TO THE HOUSE, AND TWO WERE FILED. THOSE PASSED WERE: A MEASURE TO AMEND THE INCOME TAX LAW BY EXEMPTING FROM TAXATION FARMING AND FISHING BUSINESSES HAVING A GROSS ANNUAL REVENUE OF LESS THAN \$2,000 DOLLARS (SB 260); A BILL APPROPRIATING

"BUT THIS ISSUE DOES NOT EXIST IN THE CONTEXT OF VILLAGE LIFE, AND WE ARE NOT MAKING OUR DELIBERATIONS IN THE RELATIVE ISOLATION OF OUR HOME ISLANDS, WHERE WE ARE ABLE TO WAIT A LIFETIME IF NECESSARY BEFORE REACHING A SOLUTION TO DELICATE AND TROUBLESOME QUESTIONS.

"THE PEOPLE OF THE MARIANSA AND THEIR LEADERS HAVE TOLD US FOR YEARS OF THEIR STATUS DESIRES; THEY ARE REITERATING THEIR WISHES DURING THIS SESSION; AND THEY HAVE DONE ALL OUT PLEAD WITH US TO ADOPT A FORMAL STATEMENT OF OUR THOUGHTS IN THE MATTER OF THEIR POLITICAL FUTURE.

"FAILING TO OBTAIN SUCH A RESPONSE," SAID SENATOR TMETUHL, "THEIR REPRESENTATIVES ON THE STATUS COMMITTEE QUITE JUSTIFIABLY PROCEEDED TO INITIATE STEPS TO CHART THEIR OWN COURSE AT THE SAME TIME WE VIEWED THE FIRST OUTLINE OF THE TITLES AND SECTIONS OF OUR

SENATOR TMETUHL SAID HIS RESOLUTION, WHICH THE SENATE FILED, WAS NOT INTRODUCED WITH ANY HUMEROUS INTENT, AND HE SAID HE WAS "GREATLY DISTURBED AND BITTERLY DISAPPOINTED WHEN, AFTER CAREFULLY EXPLAINING THAT I SIMPLY INTENDED THE RESOLUTION AS A VEHICLE FOR DISCUSSION OF THE ISSUE, ONLY THREE OTHER SENATORS HAD THE INTEREST AND CONCERN TO PARTICIPATE IN DEBATE.

"THERE ARE THOSE AMONG US," HE SAID, "WHO SUDDENLY FEEL THE SOLUTION LIES IN THE COURTS. THEY HAVE NOW ATTACHED THEMSELVES TO THE PROPOSITION THAT THE MARIANAS ISLANDS DISTRICT IS LEGALLY BOUND TO THE REST OF THE TRUST TERRITORY AND MUST PARTICIPATE IN A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION AND PLEBISCITE WITH THE OTHER DISTRICTS. THIS MAY BE SO. BUT ANY PERSON WHO BELIEVES THAT THE QUESTION OF THE MARIANAS FUTURE POLITICAL STATUS IS A LEGAL QUESTION TO BE SETTLED BY LITIGATION IS FOOLISHLY AND DANGEROUSLY DELUDING HIMSELF.

"THE FUTURE STATUS OF THE PEOPLE OF THE MARIANSA IS A POLITICAL ISSUE--A GUT EMOTIONAL QUESTION WHOSE DETERMINATION ALL THE LEGAL BRIEFS IN THE WORLD WILL NOT CHANGE."

POLITICAL UNITY, IS THAT ALTHOUGH MOST OF US DESIRE THE SIX DISTRICTS TO ENTER AS A UNIT INTO A NEW POLITICAL STATUS, BY FAILING TO TAKE ACTION IN THE CASE OF THE MARIANAS DISTRICT WE HAVE, IRONICALLY, FACILITATED FUTURE WITHDRAWALS BY ANY OTHER DISTRICTS. SAIPAN, SEPT. 8, (MNS)---THE MARIANA ISLANDS POLITICAL STATUS COMMISSION CONTINUED ITS FIRST MEETING ON SAIPAN FRIDAY (SEPT. 8). AFTER SELECTING CONGRESS OF MICRONESIA SENATOR EDWARD PANGELINAN AS ITS CHAIRMAN THURSDAY, THE COMMISSION MOVED INTO A DISCUSSION OF THE PROPOSED FORMAT FOR THE STATUS TALKS WHICH WILL BE CONDUCTED WITH THE UNITED STATES.

THE COMMISSION MEMBERS ALSO DECIDED TO REQUEST THAT DURING THE PERIOD OF THE STATUS TALKS, THE TRUST TERRITORY ADMINISTRATION BE ENJOINED FROM PROVIDING ANY FURTHER LAND TO FOREIGN INVESTORS EXCEPT IN URGENT CASES WHERE THE BENEFIT TO THE PEOPLE OF THE MARIANAS IS CLEARLY DEMONSTRATED. THE LEGISLATURE, IN SEEKING FOR A DIFFERENT POLITICAL STATUS, NOTED THAT PROVISIONS OF THE UNITED NATIONS CHARTER AND THE TRUSTEESHIP AGREEMENT CALL FOR SELF-DETERMINATION AND SELF-GOVERNMENT FOR ALL PEOPLE OF THE TRUST TERRITORIES.

AMONG THE DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE COMMISSION, IT WILL MAKE NECESSARY STUDIES REGARDING FUTURE POLITICAL STATUS OF THE MARIANAS, LEADING

TOWARD A CLOSE POLITICAL RELATIONSHIP WITH THE U.S. TO DO THIS, IT WILL ESTABLISH CONTACTS AND DISCUSS THE STATUS ISSUE WITH APPROPRIATE PERSONS AND AGENCIES OF THE U.S. GOVERNMENT AND THE UNITED NATIONS, SOLICITING UNDERSTANDING SUPPORT FOR THE POSITION OF THE PEOPLE OF THE MARIANAS.
