MEMORANDUM FOR HOWARD WILLENS, JAY LAPIN AND GERRY GOLDMAN SUBJECT: Further Work on Analogies

Attached is a rough outline of political status alternatives for the Marianas and a brief list of which analogies which I think need to be studied. I would tentatively suggest that we proceed to locate and summarize the relevant legal and factual materials for the analogies I have listed. This effort should provide the necessary background for us and point the way to specific legal issues which will need to be studied in greater detail -- e.g., the implications of U.S. citizenship, possible methods for terminating or amending the political status arrangement.

A Rough Outline of Political

Status Alternatives

for Marianas

1. Statehood

- A. Apparently the first step would be to make the Marianas an incorporated territory.
- B. This alternative would be politically impossible for many reasons.
 - (1) One reason is the small size of the Marianas (1971 population of 13,000). Even if associated with Guam, the population would still be small (Guam's 1970 population was 86,900, of which 52,400 were Guamanians). The rest of the Trust Territory is apparently not interested in the statehood option.
- C. This alternative need not be studied further.

2. Unincorporated Territory

A. Organized Territories

- (1) Analogies: Virgin Islands and Guam. Also apparently a draft bill proposed in January 1970 by the U.S. Delegation to the Micronesian Delegation.
- (2) All, especially Guam, should be studied in some detail.

^{1/} The U.S. state with the smallest population is Alaska. Its 1970 population was 302,000.

B. Unorganized Territories

- (1) Analogies: American Samoa (1970 population of 27,160); Johnston Atoll, Kingman Reef, Navassa Island, Palmyra Island, and Swan Islands (populated?); and, Midway and Wake Islands (no native population).
- (2) American Samoa should be studied in detail.
- C. <u>In General</u>. Research the doctrine of incorporation.
 <u>E.g.</u>, <u>Dorr</u> v. <u>United States</u>, 195 U.S. 138 (1904);
 Balzac v. Porto Rico, 258 U.S. 298 (1922).

3. Commonwealth

Fr. Branch

- A. Analogies: Puerto Rico (1970 population of 2.7 million), the U.S. proposal of May 1970 to the Micronesians, and Bahamas (1970 population of 168,000).
- B. The first two should be studied in detail and the Bahamas briefly.

4. Free Association

- A. Analogies: The draft Compact of Free Association of August 1972; a Micronesian proposal in May 1970; Cook Islands (1970 population of ?); and St. Vincent (population of 89,100) (one of the West Indian Associated States, an arrangement with Britain in which the association is terminable by either Britain or the State).
- B. The first three should be studied in some detail and St. Vincent briefly.

5. Independence

- A. Scme analogies: Nauru (1970 population of 7,000)

 (independence in 1968 after being a U.N. trusteeship

 under joint Australian, British, and New Zealand

 administration; some ties to British Commonwealth);

 Western Samoa (1971 population of 143,550) (independence

 in 1962 after being a U.N. trusteeship administered

 by New Zealand); Philippines (1970 population of

 36.7 million) (full independence in 1946); Fiji (1970

 population of 533,000) (independence from Great Britain

 in 1970); Kingdom of Tonga (estimated 1971 population

 of 90,000) (independence in 1970 after ties with Great

 Britain):
- B. Nauru and Western Samoa might be studied briefly, but independence does not seem to be the preference of the Marianas.
