MEMORANDUM FOR HOWARD WILLENS

SUBJECT: Military Land Requirements

Attached are the xeroxes of the slides which Col. McCarthy used in his briefing in the Marianas.

Adrian deGraffenried said that McCarthy only had the xeroxes and did not have a verbatim text of his briefing.

When he first told me this, I insisted that he check again because I had heard there was a text; Adrian did and repeated his earlier statement. On reviewing the attached pages plus the other statements which the U.S. had made on military land in the negotiations, I find the information tantalizing, but insufficient for a number of our critical concerns.

For example:

There is no underlying rationale in any detail for the exact amount of land which they have requested on Tinian. (Of course there is a similar complaint about Saipan.)

-- In calculating the economic impact of the base, it would be helpful to know how many U.S. military and dependents there would be stationed there. All we have now is the number of military who would be assigned directly to base operations and support. (Briefing, p. 14.) For Phase 7, this is 2370 men. However, this does not include an estimate of their dependents.

Also it does not include the men who would be assigned to the combat units themselves. For instance, if a B-52 wing (about 45 planes) was based there, another 1500 men would be assigned to that wing (as well as dependents).

Let me sharpen some earlier suggestions I made to you.

- -- Our priority now should be on the issues of the applicability of the Constitution and U.S. laws and on the work of the Economic/Finance Committee.
- -- When we get to the various studies of military issues which you have suggested earlier, an underlying concern should be to probe to determine what, if any, flexibility there is in the size of the military land request. Also, we should seek to determine what opportunities there are to make military uses compatible with civilian development. To accomplish this, it would be useful for me and others to discuss the issues further with Col. McCarthy. We can also consult with people at Brookings whom I know.
- -- Once we know a little more, we should pursue the issues further with the Office of Micronesian Status Negotiations (I understand Crowe is leaving shortly if he has not already . departed.)
- -- We should discuss the military issues with the NSC staff. (Whether we clear this or not with Williams' office,

can be decided later.) My best NSC contact on this issue is Phil Odeen. Phil is my old boss, a friend, one of Kissinger's five deputies, and the Director of the Program Analysis Division on the NSC staff. Phil's office reportedly has action on the military part of the negotiations. Another contact is his staff man, George Reidel, an Army officer whom I know.

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

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
