

Marianas, U.S. Talking Money

SAIPAN. After a week of negotiations, the Marianas Political Status Commission and the United States have moved to a discussion of the economic and financial aspects of the proposed new Marianas government.

The talk is still revolving around conceptual approaches to how the Marianas will create sources of income and how the United States will provide financial support. It was not the intent of this third round of negotiations, said a U.S. spokesman, to arrive at specific and final agreements on

finances.

According to Sen. Edward DLG. Pangelinan, chairman of the Marianas commission, his 15-member delegation is "still exploring alternatives" in this area.

Working sessions are planned this weekend, with the controversial subject of land and U.S. military requirements in

the Marianas expected to be taken up soon.

The U.S. delegation to the Marianas future status talks is led by Ambassador Franklin Haydn Williams and includes his deputy, James M. Wilson Jr. and Navy Capt. Richard Y. Scott.
