Temporary Aliens OKd For All Jobs

Gov. Kurt Moylan has received commitment from the U.S. Immigration and

The Governor's office made the announcement yesterday. Moylan is in Washington.

A spokesman for the Governor's office said he did not know what limitations, if any, would Naturalization Service (INS) for importation of apply to the number of alien workers who will . receive visas under the move.

One source said it will be the first time since the late 1950s - before more stringent military security regulations were instituted by the INS that alien labor numbers will be relatively unlimited.

In Washington Moylan commented, "We are really pleased with the results of our conference with Gen. Chapman. (4.S. Chapman head of the INS). It means that Guam can continue to grow without being hamstrung by a lack of skilled labor."

Moylan is expected to return this weekend.

The program is the result of a plan the Governor's office had to permit aliens to work in farming and fishing here. It was expanded to include other industries during a meeting between Moylan and Chapman.

The result is described as a three-year "starter program," Moylan said.

Under the plan employers must conduct approved training programs for local residents who will replace the temporary workers when they return to their countries.
