- 1. OMSN objectives for Ad Hoc Preparatory Committee:
- a. <u>Primary</u> To develop a detailed plan of action for Phase I to include recommendations on how to get Phase I off to a good start.

b. <u>Secondary</u>

- (1) To show the need for MPSC, TT and Marianas District participation in the work of the Ad Hoc Committee and the Joint Secretariat.
- (2) To lay the groundwork for creating a Saipan-based Joint Secretariat for Phase I period.
- 2. Talking Points:
 - a. Organization OMSN
 - (1) General
 - (a) Policy Guidance Jim Wilson
 - (b) Overall coordination Dick Scott
 - (2) Economics/Finance Sol Silver
 - (3) Political Steve Loftus
 - Terms of reference -(see enclosure (1))
 - c. Agenda
- (1) Initial priority given to planning for the politically oriented actions, i.e., political education program; plebiscite; constitutional convention and referendum; legal studies relating to organizational structure; and legislative program.

- (2) Planning for socio-economic oriented actions begins mid February after Sol Silver returns from Saipan.
 - d. Timing
 - (1) May want to slip Ad Hoc Committee final report to March 15, 1974.
- (2) Complete work plan for politically oriented items by February 15, 1974.
 - (3) Complete socio-economic work plan by February 28, 1974.
- (a) This may be difficult in view of Sol Silver's absence until mid February.
 - e. General guidelines for Phase I planning
 - (1) Phase I planning in two parts

PART I POLITICAL

- -- Areas within Marianas purview; U.S. does not propose joint action.
 - Constitutional convention and referendum
 - Political education.
 - Plebiscite.
- -- Organization of new government
 - Marianas responsibility even though final plan must be approved by U.S.

PART II

- -- Economic/Social Infrastructure Planning
 - Marianas take lead
 - U.S. participation in view of our responsibility to get funds from Congress for Phase I.

f. Political/Government organization planning

- -- Political education
 - money for education for self-government in TT budget
 - . Joint approach after agreement is signed.
 - Similar in approach to program for other five districts.
 - Use of experts in TT and U.S. Government agencies.

-- Constitutional Convention

- U.S. Government experts and documentation available.
- Experience of JCFS/COM in forming convention.
- Source of pride and accomplishment if Consitution is a product of Marianas' effort.
- Planning for constitutional convention and referendum should include organization of interim de facto government and role of District Legislature and COM members during interim period.
- -- Plebiscite on future political status
 - Need to keep U.N. in mind when drafting alternative plebiscite programs.
 - Keep in mind U.S. Congressional attitudes especially as pertains to future relations with Guam.
- -- Legal studies re: organizational structure and initial legislative program.
 - Use of U.S. Government experts.
 - Use of Legislative referral system.
 - Use of TT and District Administration experts.
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g. Socio-Economic Planning

-- Source

- Must take into account views of those responsible for physical planning in TT and District.
- Review currently available studies and those currently underway to see if they meet Phase I requirements.
- Marianan experts in the private sector.
- Seconding of USG experts.

h. Joint Commission/Joint Secretariat

- -- Joint Commission
 - Membership high level, 3 Marianans, 2 U.S.
 - Infrequent meetings for policy guidance and problem resolutions
 - No salaries only out of pocket expenses.

-- Joint Secretariat

- Head Prominent citizen of Marianas
- Members two each from Marianas/U.S.
- Budget officer U.S. to satisfy Congress in accountability of funds.
- Based in Saipan
- Not a policy making organization
- Will provide a "collective, pluralistic response" to MPSC needs
- Will be able to draw on resources of TT, USG and employ private consultants
- Members would be salaried
- Would use Joint Commission to resolve problems such as lack of cooperation from TT.

i. Funding

- -- Ad Hoc Committee
 - U.S. will fund in amount \$45,000
 - Source of funds undetermined
- -- Phase I
 - U.S. will fund
 - Level of funding to be studied by Ad Hoc Committee
 - Maximum participation by Marianas to keep costs down
 - Consideration of U.S. Congress reaction to request for Phase I funds.
 - U.S. prepared to find funds for Phase I when agreement is in right requires close liaison with OMB and Congress
 - Believe U.S. Congress will approve funds for Phase I
- 3. <u>Summary</u> The Ad Hoc Preparatory Committee should obtain agreement on specific list of problems.
 - Obtain agreement on respective roles of both sides i.e., who does what and in what sequence.
 - Identify resources to accomplish talks.
 - Obtain full range of views on Phase I from MPSC, Marianas District Government, TT Administration and interested U.S. agencies.
