(KUMANGAI ON ESG) SAIPAN, OCT. 15 (MNS) TRUST TERRITORY DIRECTOR OF HEALTH SERVICES DR. MASAO KUMANGAI SAID LAST WEEK THAT THERE ARE UNNO PLANS AT PRESENT TO CHARGE FOR HEALTH CARE SERVICES IN THE TRUST TERRITORY UNDER A NEW FORM OF SELF-GOVERNMENT, DR. KUMANGAI SAID THAT HEALTH CARE COSTS SHOULD BE BORNE EQUALLY BY ALL CITIZENS THROUGH SOME SYSTEM OF TAXATION OR INSURANCE. HE POINTED OUT THAT THIS WOULD PROBABLY VERY EXPENSIVE, SINCE TO MATCH THE PRESENT LEVEL OF HEALTH CARE, IT WOULD COST EACH PERSON 552 A YEAR, OR, FOR A FAMILY OF TEN, \$520.

THE HEALTH DIRECTOR MADE HIS COMMENTS ON THE EDUCATION FOR. SELF-GOVERNMENT PROGRAM "DIALOGUE FOR MICRONESIA."

THE PALAUAN DIRECTOR NOTED THAT WHILE THE AVERAGE IN-PATIENT COST IS \$30 PER DAY, THE HOSPITALS ARE COLLECTING ONLY 40-CENTS A DAY. HE SAID HEALTH CARE FOR MICRONESIANS AT PRESENT COULD BE DESCRIBED AS "PRACTICALLY FREE," SINCE ANNUAL COLLECTIONS ARE ONLY 80,000 COMMARED WITH EXPENDITURES OF NEARLY \$9 MILLION DOLLARS. HE FURTHER SAID THAT NO MICRONESIAN IS DENIED MEDICAL CARE FOR INABILITY TO PAY. HE ADDED THAT ODDLY ENOUGH, THEY FIND THAT IT IS THE MICRONESIANS WHO CAN AFFORD TO PAY, WHO DO NOT PAY THEIR BILLS, AND THAT THOSE WHO CAN LEAST AFFORD TO DO SO, DO PAY.

ASKED WHETHER ANY PROPOSED LEGISLATION HAS BEEN DRAFTED TO SET UP EITHER A TAXATION OR INSURANCE SYSTEM OF PAYING FOR HEALTH CARE, DR. KUMANGAI RESPONDED THAT THE TT HEALTH COUNCIL HAS DISCUSSED THE MATTER SEVERAL TIMES. BUT, HE SAID, THE COUNCIL FEELS THAT IT IS UP TO THE LEGISLATIVE BRANCH OF THE GOVERNMENT TO COME UP WITH AN APPROPRIATE PROGRAM.

IN RESPONSE TO A QUESTION ON WHETHER THERE IS A DRUG PROBLEM IN THE TRUST TERRITORY, DR. KUMANGAI SAID THERE IS NOT A PROBLEM AT THIS TIME. HE EMPHASIZED THAT HE WAS REFERRING TO HARD DRUGS, NOT MARIJUANA. HE CONTINUED THAT MANY YOUNG PEOPLE HAVE TRIED MARIJUANA, BUT ADDED, "UNTIL WE KNOW MORE ABOUT MARIJUANA, I AM ONE OF THOSE WHO OPFOSES ITS LEGALIZATION." DR. KUMANGAI ALSO SAID THAT HE WAS SATISFIED WITH THE DRUG LAW PASSED DURING THE RECENT SPECIAL SESSION OF THE CONGRESS OF MICRONESIA.

COMMENTING ON WHAT STEPS ARE BEING TAKEN TO PROVIDE MORE MICRONESIAN DOCTORS, NURSES AND TECHNICIANS, THE HEALTH SERVICES DIRECTOR SAID THAT WHILE FOUR OR FIVE STUDENTS HAVE BEGUN THEIR MEDICAL STUDIES EACH YEAR FOR THE PAST TEN YEARS, THERE ARE ONLY TWO TODAY WHO ARE STUDYING TO BECOME SPECIALISTS. HE POINTED OUT THAT THE ATTRITION RATE AMONG MEDICAL STUDENTS IS VERY HIGH--95% PERCENT IN THE U.S. SCHOOLS AND 80-85 PERCENT IN FIJI. HE NOTED THAT

MORE THAN 100 STUDENTS HAVE GONE TO FIJI MEDICAL SCHOOL OVER THE YEARS, BUT MEDICAL OFFICERS HAVE BEEN PRODUCED AT A RATE OF ONLY TWO EVERY TWO YEARS.

HE DESCRIBED MICRONESIAN MEDICAL OFFICERS AS "CAPTIVES IN THEIR OWN COUNTRY" BECAUSE WITHOUT AN MD DEGREE, THEY CANNOT PRACTICE MEDICINE OUTSIDE MICRONESIA.

TRUST TERRITORY HEALTH CARE IS BELOW THAT OF THE UNITED STATES, BOTH IN QUANTITY AND QUALITY, BUT IT IS WELL ABOVE THE LEVEL OF HEALTH CARE IN MANY WESTERN PACIFIC AND SOUTHEAST ASIA DEVELOPING NATIONS, DR. MUMANGAI SAID. HE CITED FIGURES OF DOCTOR-PATIENT RATIOS, PER CAPITA EXPENDITURES FOR HEALTH CARE, AND TOTAL EXPENDITURES FOR SUPPLIES, EQUIPMENT AND PATIENT **11514** REFERRALS TO SHOW A HIGHER LEVEL OF HEALTH CARE IN THE TRUST TERRITORY THAN IN THE KINGDOME OF TONGA AND WESTERN SAMOA, AS EXAMPLES OF COMPARABLE AREAS.

DR. KUMANGAI SAID THE HEALTH SERVICES DEPARTMENT IS FACING NUMEROUS PROBLEMS, BUT THE BIGGEST ONE IN THE NEXT FIVE YEARS IS THE MANAGEMENT OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES. TO SOLVE THE PROBLEM, HE SAID, THE CAUSES MUST BE ELIMINATED, LISTING POOR SANITATION, POOR WUTRITION- POOR HOUSING AND OVERCROWDING AS SEVFRAL OF THE PROBLEMS.

HE ADMITTED THAT NOT ENOUGH IS BEING DONE AT PRESENT IN THE AREA OF HEALTH EDUCATION, BUT ADDED THAT IN COOPERATION WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION A PROGRAM IS BEING DEVELOPED FOR THE SCHOOLS, AND ANOTHER PROGRAM IS BEING PREPARED FOR ADULTS, PARTICULARLY MOTHERS OF SMALL CHILDREN.

DR. KUMANGAI'S COMMENTS WILL BE HEARD THROUGHOUT MICRONESIA AS THE "DIALOGUE" PROGRAMS ARE TAPE RECORDED AND DISTRIBUTED TO THE SIX TRUST TERRITORY RADIO STATIONS.
