Monday, January 27, 1975

The House of Representatives of the Sixth Congress of Micronesia, First Regular Session, 1975, was called to order at 10:05 a.m., Monday, January 27, 1975.

Vice Speaker Ekpap Silk presided.

A moment of silent prayer was observed.

The Chief Clerk called the roll. Nineteen members were present. Representative Balos and Speaker Henry were excused.

Floor Leader Tman moved to suspend the reading of the Journal; Representative Sigrah seconded, and the motion carried by voice vote.

#### STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Standing Committee Report No. 6-4, submitted by the Committee on Appropriations, re H.B. No. 6-7, "To appropriate the sum of \$45,900 from the General Fund of the Congress of Micronesia for the purpose of defraying the operation and contingent expenses of the administration of the Trust Territory Personnel Board and for other purposes."

Chairman Setik moved for adoption of the report; Floor Leader Tman seconded, and the motion carried by voice vote.

#### BILL CALENDAR

H.B. No. 6-7, HD1:

To appropriate the sum of **\$45,990** <u>\$31,000</u> from the General Fund of the Congress of Micronesia for the purpose of defraying the operation and contingent expenses of the administration of the Trust Territory Personnel Board; <u>amending Section 2 of P.L.</u> No. 5-62 relating to the reversion of funds appropriated to the Personnel Board by that law, and for other purposes.

Representative Setik moved for passage of H.B. No. 6-7, HD1, on First Reading; Floor

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Leader Tman seconded, and the Chief Clerk read the title. The motion carried by voice vote.

H.B. No. 6-1:

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To increase Social Security benefits; to amend Subsections (1) and (2) of Section 105 of Title 73 of the Trust Territory Code as amended by Public Law No. 5-7, and for other purposes.

Representative Basilius moved for passage of H.B. No. 6-1 on Second Reading; Floor Leader Tman seconded, and the Chief Clerk read the title.

<u>Rep. Haruo:</u> Mr. Speaker, the other day I raised some points relating to the Social Security Program. It was my understanding from testimony that the Social Security Administrator will have a consolidated bill, which is about to be submitted to this Congress for enactment. I believe it is appropriate that perhaps an interim measure should be enacted in order to provide a little more of the pension presently allowable to the beneficiaries. One argument of the Administration in recommending passage of this measure was because of inflation. The bill in front of us now proposes an increase of benefits for beneficiaries from \$12.00 to \$24.00 per month. Identifying some of this possible movement in the future, one would be the possibility of merging the Social Security Funds into the Development Bank of Micronesia, where perhaps the interest rate would be affected. None of us knows what the interest rate will be. Currently the interest rates that are being accrued from outside institutions where the money is being invested run between eight and 9 per cent. Now if the money was merged and deposited in the Development Bank of Micronesia, the interest rate may be lower. Therefore, the money way be affected (the Social Security Fund). Mr. Speaker, I feel that this Congress should wait for the other consolidated piece of legislation which the Administration is about to submit to this Congress, and then we can act on that before we pass this measure. Thank you.

<u>Rep. Basilius</u>: I do appreciate the concern of my colleague from Truk in regard to House Bill No. 6-1. However, by looking at the correspondence between the Consultant of the Social Security and the recommendations of the Social Security Administrator, I believe that my colleague is referring to a study that will be presented to the Congress. However, referring to a memorandum from the Social Security Consultant, Robert Meyers, dated November 7, 1974, it states that the actuarial study will be made available by next summer. I don't think the Congress will be able to get legislation for the entire Social Security during this session, but I would like to point out that this increase is only an interim increase. Right now 370 families, based on the Standing Committee Report--inflation has been existing in the Trust Territory--the cost of living is getting higher, and I think we have to be concerned about these families who are receiving less money. Also I would like to indicate that, based on the letter from the Social Security Administrator, it says that they have been assured that the increase will not adversely affect the retirement funds. I think that is the statement that we should be concerned with. I am sure my colleague is worried that the increase will affect the Social Security Fund, but we have received a statement from the Administrator that it doesn't affect it at all. By the way, the increase will be \$2,400 a month if this interest increase goes into effect.

<u>Rep. Haruo:</u> Mr. Speaker, I don't believe that we should accept anything from a Consultant who has not made the actual findings about the Social Security Programs. They mentioned that this increase will not adversely affect the fund. The question was raised whether this consultant had looked into the possibility of merging this money into the Development Bank of Micronesia. The answer was no. Therefore, in that particular instance, Mr. Speaker, I feel perhaps the money would be affected as a result of this, because the consultant has not yet thoroughly made the study about this concept of merging the money into the Micronesian Development Bank. Therefore the report is premature, because no study has ever been conducted.

<u>Rep. Basilius</u>: I am quite confused on the statement made by my colleague from Truk. I think the subject matter is the increase of the Social Security benefits. It has nothing to do with the Bank of Micronesia.

Floor Leader Tman moved for a short recess; Representative Domnick seconded, and the motion carried by voice vote. The Vice Speaker declared the House recessed at 10:22 a.m., subject to the call of the Chair.



The House reconvened at 10:25 a.m.

Vice Speaker Silk: Is there any more discussion on House Bill No. 6-1?

The Clerk called the roll, and House Bill No. 6-1 passed Second Reading by a vote of nineteen ayes; Representative Balos and Speaker Henry were excused.

H.B. No. 6-13, HD1:

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To add a new <u>subparagraph (iii)</u> paragraph (£), to <u>paragraph</u> (f), Subsection (Ø) (1), Section 101, of Title 53 of the Trust Territory Code making Jaluit Anchorage, Jabor Island, Jaluit Atoll, Marshall Islands District, the <u>an</u> official port of entry and for other purposes.

Representative Haruo moved for passage of H.B. No. 6-13, HD1, on Second Reading; Representative Domnick seconded, and the Chief Clerk read the title.

Rep. Basilius: Mr. Speaker, what about the port in Majuro? Would this change the official port of the Marshalls?

Rep. Haruo: This is an additional official port of entry in the Marshalls.

<u>Rep. Basilius</u>: Why do we have to make an official port, Mr. Speaker? If we permit the ship to come into any islands in the Trust Territory, then that is a port. What is the purpose of making an official port at Jaluit? I believe the ship can go to Kusaie now, but it can be an official port or a nonofficial port.

<u>Rep. Haruo</u>: Mr. Speaker, this is an aspiration of the people in the Marshalls. There is a trend now to establish Jaluit as a subdistrict center, and more of the fishing activities will be developed in that particular area. Therefore the people in the Marshalls wish to establish Jaluit as another official port of entry.

<u>Rep. Basilius</u>: If that is the case, Mr. Speaker (if I have the floor) I wonder if the committee made a study on how much expense will be involved because, as you know, they have to have Immigration staff and Administration representatives--Customs and all that. I wonder if they had an opportunity to discuss how much it will cost if they make this an official port.

<u>Rep. Haruo</u>: The Administration is making those financial studies which will be involved in establishing Jaluit as a subdistrict center. Your Committee on Resources and Development only dealt with establishing Jaluit as another port of entry.

<u>Rep. Basilius</u>: I think the intent would be in order if we changed the bill to declare that Jaluit would be a subdistrict, rather than a port of entry. The question now is that we have to come up with the financial studies before we decide to declare Jaluit as an official port. If the intent of the bill is to make Jaluit a subdistrict, then why don't we come up with a bill to declare that, rather than that it become a port of entry?

Floor Leader Tman moved for the previous question; Representative Domnick seconded.

Rep. Basilius: I just wanted to point out that I think we should consider the cost of making Jaluit an official port of entry.

Vice Speaker Silk: There is a motion on the floor to close debate.

The motion to close debate carried by voice vote.

The Clerk called the roll, and House Bill No. 6-13, HDI, passed Second Reading by a vote of eighteen ayes; Representative Basilius voted no; Representative Balos and Speaker Henry were excused.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE EDWARDS

Mr. Speaker, distinguished members of the House:

After finally resolving the matter of credentials, which has dominated most of the actions of this Sixth Congress to date, I wish to offer a few thoughts before we go on to other matters. The first is that I want to offer my sincere thanks and congratulations to all the members of our Credentials Committees for a job well done. Such a task, we all realize, can sometimes be unpleasant, but it is also a necessary part of organizing the Congress. In view of this fact, let me say that I have no hard feelings towards any member of this House. I will say, however, that I believe a very thorough and professional job was done, a job all Micronesians can be proud of, because without this kind of close investigation and evaluation, the very reputation and existence of this Congress would be at stake.

Second, I want to offer my view of the reason for existence of this Congress. The purpose of this legislative body is not to see what we can do for our own particular districts, but rather what we, working together, can do for all of the people of Micronesia in all of the districts.

Let us then consider important legislation not on the basis of who is the introducer, or what is his home district, but on the basis of merit - the basis of "will it do the most good for the greater good of all Micronesians."

Connected to this idea is that of Micronesian unity. There has been much discussion in past sessions of the Congress concerning this issue, and for good reason. The time is approaching fast, when as a self-governing nation, our responsibilities will greatly increase. Therefore, I believe this Sixth Congress must be noted not for talking about unity, but for <u>doing</u> something about unity.

One way to accomplish this unity, in my point of view, would be for the Congress to set priorities for Micronesia and to accomplish major advancements for the people in the areas of economic, social and political development. Two areas outstanding in my mind right now are the need to act soon on the upcoming Micronesian Constitutional Convention, and to consider what we should do about the Fecently-issued Departmental Order No. 2969.

In doing so, we must make our decisions, and form our goals on these common problems to make sure that our unity is maintained and made stronger, and to eliminate those forces which tend to divide us.

Let us strive for the common good, and let us strive for unity.

These are my few, brief comments, Mr. Speaker and members of the House. Thank you. -84<u>Rep. Aafin</u>: Mr. Speaker and members of the House. Just last Friday I stated that I was the most junior member of the House, having come in last. But I was surprised this morning during the roll call that I was called first. I wish to apologize to the House and to the Chair for not coming out first on the succeeding roll calls, because I think as the last guy, I have to be the last to be called too.

Rep. Guerrero: Mr. Speaker, I would like the House to recognize the presence of our Municipal Legislator for Saipan, Mr. Joaquin Torres, and Mr. Mike Sablan of the Police Force.
