Territory to cease and desist from any and all activities and
negotiations with separate self-determination, and urging the

A RESOLUTION

Respectfully requesting the Administering Authority of the Trust Territory to cease and desist from any and all activities and negotiations with separate districts of Micronesia; to allow Micronesians to exercise their right of self-determination; and urging the peoples of Micronesia to utilize the central legislative body in determining their future; directing the Committee on Judiciary and Governmental Relations to exercise any means necessary in ensuring the fulfillment of the intent and purpose of this Resolution; and for other purposes.

- WHEREAS, it is the sense of the Third Ponape District Legislature, Sixth
- Regular Session, 1975, that the United States, as Administering Authority for
- the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, is obligated under the United
- Nations Charter and the Trusteeship Agreement of the Former Japanese Mandated
- Islands to foster the political, economic, social and educational advancement
- of the inhabitants of Micronesia and to promote, to the fullest extent possible,
- the development of the Territory toward self-sufficiency and self-government; and
- WHEREAS, it is also the sense of this Legislature that because of the
- smallness and isolated nature of the islands of Micronesia, and because of the
- limited resources, personnel, and labor force available in the Trust Territory,
- economic, social and political advancement toward self-sufficiency can only be 11
- accomplished through a high degree of political cooperation and economic inter-12
- action between and among the districts of Micronesia; and 13
- WHEREAS, despite the long tradition of consolidated administration by the 14
- German, the Japanese and the American administrations, and despite repeated 15
- protests by the Congress of Micronesia and strong criticism by the 1973 United
- Nations Visiting Team to the Trust Territory, the United States, in promoting
- its own territorial and military interests in the Northern Mariana Islands, has
- instituted separate status negotiations with the political subdivision of the
- Trust Territory Government known as the Mariana Islands District for its
- incorporation into the territorial possessions of the United States of America;

- WHEREAS, the United States has initiated these separate negotiations with 23
- this important segment of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands which is
- rich in potential for economic and social growth and equipped by the United

States with the most highly developed infrastructure of all the islands of

Micronesia, without any consideration of the crucial importance of the Northern

Mariana Islands for the future development and economic vitality of the

remainder of Micronesia; and

WHEREAS, the unprecedented action of the United States Government in 5

negotiating separately with the Mariana Islands District has unwittingly

encouraged various interest groups within the other districts of Micronesia to

exploit the possibilities of asserting the right of separate status negotiations

at a time when the Trust Territory is faced with political and economic crisis,

significantly jeopardizing the viability of our central legislative body and

the fragile thread of unity in Micronesia so essential for the maintenance of

the territorial integrity and economic vitality in the Trust Territory; and

WHEREAS, the Congress of Micronesia through repeated acts and resolutions, 13

and the esteemed traditional leaders of the islands of Micronesia, assembled

in conference, by resolution and potition, have sought in every way possible to

counteract the disruptive activities of the Administering Authority which are

resulting in the fractionalization and disunification of Micronesia; and

WHEREAS, the Congress of Micronesia has further sought to enable all the 18

peoples of Micronesia to decide, in accordance with duly established and

19 recognized means of democratic political expression, what form of political status 20

and future government is best for them, by calling for a Constitutional Convention 21

with delegates representing every district of Micronesia to convene in July, 1975; 22

and 23

WHEREAS, the Congress of Micronesia, in its most recent Regular Session, 24

passed legislation calling for a national referendum not later than July 12, 1975,

l which among other things, will seek to determine whether the people of

2 Micronesia wish to continue the unified nature of Micronesia; now, therefore,

3 BE IT RESOLVED by the Third Ponape District Legislature, Sixth Regular

4 Session, 1975, for and on behalf of the people of Ponape District, that the

5 Administering Authority of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands is hereby

6 respectfully requested to cease and desist from any and all activities and

7 negotiations with the separate political subdivisions of Micronesia which

8 disrupt the territorial integrity of Micronesia in order to promote its own

9 territorial and military goals within the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands,

10 and to allow the people of Micronesia, through their inherent right of self-deter-

ll mination, to develop for themselves the nature and scope of the government of

12 Micronesia; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all the peoples of Micronesia are hereby humbly

14 requested and beseeched to utilize the legal modes of self-expression provided

15 by the central legislative body of the Trust Territory Government to determine

16 the future of Micronesia, and to approach the Constitutional Convention for

17 Micronesia with open minds and a sense of cooperation necessary to ensure a

18 viable political future for all the peoples of Micronesia; and

19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Committee on Judiciary and Governmental

20 Relations of the Ponape District Legislature is hereby authorized and directed

21 to exercise any means necessary, court action or otherwise, to ensure that the

22 intent and purpose of this Resolution is realized; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted

24 to the United Nations Trustceship Council, the President of the United States
