Legislature building DNA... named after Mafnas

GOVERNOR Froilan C. Tenorio yesterday approved a bill naming the House of Representatives Building after the late Vice Speaker Jesus P. Mafnas.

"Jesus P. Mafnas was one of the most important figures in our Commonwealth's recent history. It is fitting that we give him this honor," Tenorio

The House of Representatives Building, now officially known as Vice Speaker Jesus P. Mafnas Memorial Building, is occupied by both the House and the Senate.

Its previous official name was Building Number Nine.

Although it houses the legislature, the building is owned by the executive branch.

According to the approved House Bill 9-421, which has become Public Law 9-62,



Mafnas deserves recognition and honor since he was the first legislator to die while in office. He died last May 21.

I personally oppose such legislative initiative but it is not proper for me to conduct a public campaign against it," Guerrero said.

In the same manner, Guerrero said government agencies should remain neutral in any of the amendment issues.

He was reacting to a reported plan of the board of education to campaign for the rejection of proposed amendments

"They prepared a stipulation. And they came and asked the judge what they agreed with," said the visibly irked Castro.

David Lujan and David Nevitt, counsels for the petitioner and executor respectively, recently signed a stipulation indicating their cooperation over the test.

"It is not proper for any government agency to take any position. If they oppose it, they can't do it publicly," the ConCon chief said.

Under the ConCon's proposed amendment, the board lost the power to formulate policies. This power has been transferred to the PSS commissioner appointed by the governor.

The board will instead become

merely an implementing body.

Delegate Esther Fleming dismissed suggestions that the proposed setup would "politicize" the public school

"Even if the commissioner is appointed by the governor, he will still have to abide by the law,"Fleming said.

She said the Convention entered provisions that will guarantee noninterference of politics in the school level.

In the first place, Fleming said the board members cannot complain now after they have ignored the ConCon's invitation for them to take part in public hearings.
"While we were in conducting hear-

ings, not one from the education agency came to give opinion," Fleming said.

"The delegates came up with what they think are best for the community," Fleming said.

Now that the ratification has been moved to a later date, Guerrero said the post Convention committee will have more ample time to educate the voters.
