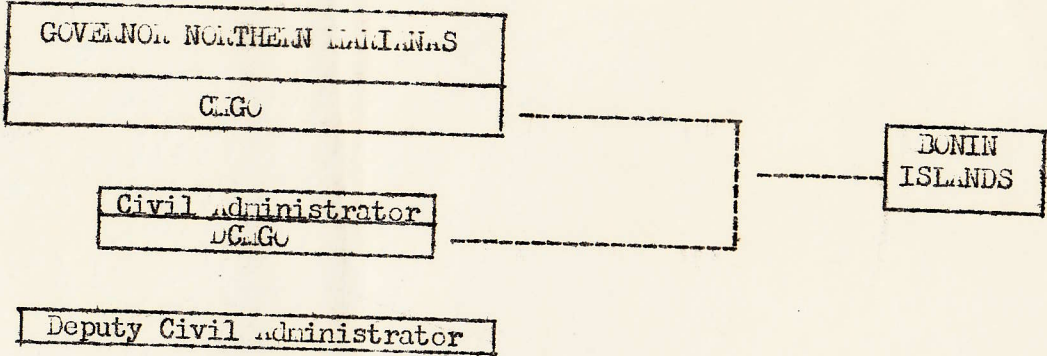
CIVIL ADMINISTRATION UNIT - SAIPAN DISTRICT

MISSION

It shall be the mission of this Unit under the jurisdiction of the Navy Department to discharge the obligations of the United States under the Trusteeship Agreement and to this end we shall effect:

- (A) The early establishment of self-governing communities.
- (B) The institution and maintenance of an adequate program for public health and sanitation.
- (C) The establishment of a general system of elementary education adapted to local environments and designed to assist in the early achievement of the objectives enumerated herein and the facilitation of vocational and higher education, including training on the professional levels.
- (D) The protection of the local inhabitants against the loss of their land and resources and the institution of a sound program of economic development of trade, industry and agriculture along lines which will ensure that the profits and benefits thereof accrue to the inhabitants and which will assist them in achieving the highest possible level of economic independence.
- (E) The physical restoration of damaged property and facilities.

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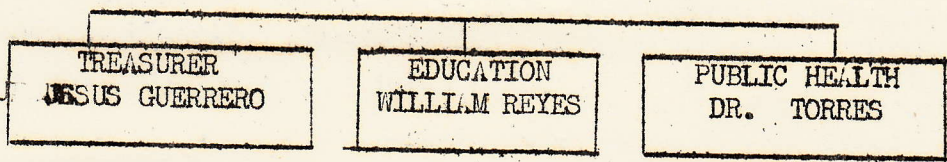

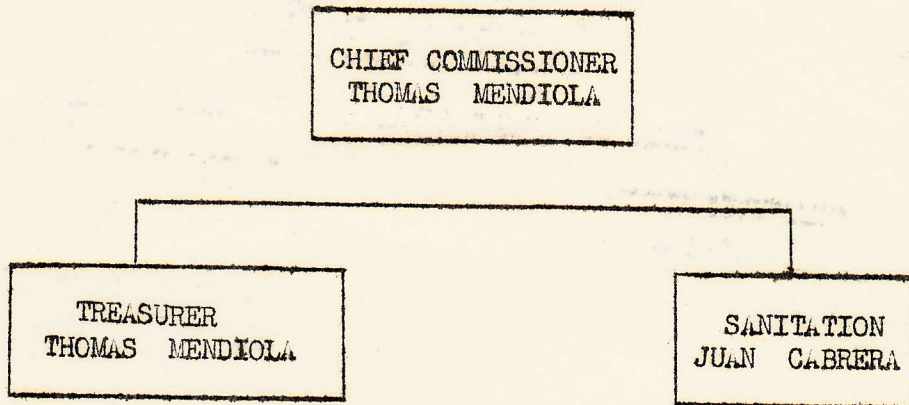

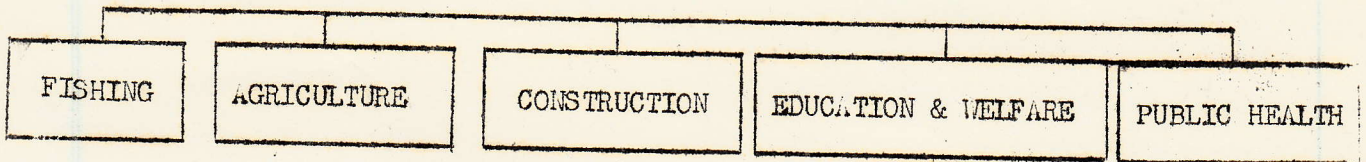

PUBLIC SAFETY

Law and order is maintained by the Saipan Branch of the Central Pacific Insular Constabulary. The Constabulary was established 1 February, 1948 by the Civil Administrator pursuant to the authority contained in Commander Marianas letter serial 4618, dated 17 March, 1948. This letter provided general instructions concerning the establishment, missions, training, duties, powers, size and organization of the Insular Constabulary for each district, pending consolidation of the whole Marianas Area.

The primary mission of the constabulary is the preservation of peace and the prevention of crime. The secondary missions include guard and sentry duty for security purposes, patrol duty, fire prevention and fire fighting, court duty as bailiff and as prosecutor in community courts, duty as jailer and custodian, military duty as orderly or messenger for ceremonial purposes and duty as civil prisoner guards.

The constabulary at present consists of 36 men, 32 being on duty at Saipan with two on detached duty at both Tinian and Rota. The constabulary is administered by S/SGT P.A. McConkey, USMC.

The civil jail, located in the constabulary compound, has space for recomodation of seventeen prisoners. The present prisoner census shows ten in confinement.

The average census is twelve to fourteen. Prison labor is utilized on Civil Administration work projects.

The Public Safety Office, heade by Mr. V.D.L. Guerrero, maintains vital statistics, issues licenses, native travel authorizations and pass-ports.

JUSTICE

SAIPAN

The judiciary system on Saipan is as prescribed in Interim Regulation 1-48. There is one Community Court, presided over by Mr. Elias Sablan, the Chief Commissioner of Saipan. The Community Court is located in the Administration building in Chalan Kanoa village. This Court tries all criminal offenses which are subject to a sentence of six months imprisonment and/or \$100.00 fine, and all civil cases when the amount involved is \$100.00 or less.

The Justice court, presided over by LT John N. Hightower Jr., USN, tries all cases involving traffic violations, and is competent to try all criminal offenses which are subject to a sentence of one year's imprisonment and/or \$1000.00 fine, and all civil cases where the amount at issue does not exceed \$1000.00. Fines for traffic violations average \$400.00 per month.

The Superior Court, located in the Civil Administration Courtroom is presided over by J.N. Hightower Jr. LT., U.S. Navy and two additional members designated by the Governor Northern Marianas. The Saipan Court is competent to try all civil and criminal cases outside the jurisdiction of the Community and Justice Courts, as well as all cases appealed from the two lower courts.

TINIAN

There is one Court, the Community Court, on Tinian, located in the administration building in the village of San Jose. The Community Court is presided over by Mr. Henry Hofschneider, the Chief Commissioner of Tinian. All offenses which do not fall under the jurisdiction of the Tinian Community Court are referred to the higher courts on Saipan.

ROTA

The judicial system on Rota is the same as that on Tinian. The Community Court is presided over by Mr. Carlos Calvo, the Chief Commissioner of Rota. All offenses outside the jurisdiction of the Community Court are referred to the higher courts on Saipan.

OUT ISLANDS.

All cases, criminal and civil, occurring on the islands of Alamagan, Agrihan, Chichi Jima are tried by Civil Administration courts and personnel there being no community courts on these islands.

c. Location.

1. Situated on the south side of the island of Tinian, south of 8th Avenue. One mile from Tinian harbor.

d. Information.

1. The colony itself consists of fifty huts, one general church, two storehouses, ten cook huts, four sets of heads and showers. One building is being used temporarily as Lab and dispensary. A new dispensary with two wards, surgery, lab, X-ray, and pharmacy is near completion. One garage and generator shed, consisting of one 60 K.W. GMC generator Diesel and one 20 K.W. Caterpillar generator Diesel. Two houses housing corpsmen and boatswain mate. Quarters for the Medical officer and Chief Warrant Officer are under construction and are nearly completed.

(a) What is Being Done:- All patients are receiving symptomatic treatment, consisting of sterile bandages for plantar and lepomatous ulcers. Supportative vitamin, iron therapy, serum albumin and plasma is being given too. Sulphone treatment, which is specific for Hansen's Disease, has been instituted in those patients that it is indicated. Fishing is being done by the patients with some success - this is gradually improving. There is about six acres under corn cultivation. Taro and Yams also are being grown. One hundred coconut trees have been transplanted. Five hundred more are in the process of being planted. A few bottle nut trees have been started. There are two hundred chickens, six pigs, and four goats.

ECONOMICS

The economy of the Saipan District is based on Agriculture, fishing, copra, and employment by the various service activities. The department is headed by Lt. John N. Hightower, Jr., USN, who is ably assisted by Mr. Ignacio Benavente, the Agriculture extension agent. The department employs ten(10) native workers at the Agriculture Station.

Agriculture is considered the basic foundation of the district economy. With the closing down of various service activities and consequent discharge of labor more and more people are returning to the land. The production of Subsistence farms is indeterminate, it however defrays a good part of the native food budget. Commercial farming is represented on Saipan by the Saipan Farm Association. The average monthly production is 30,000 lbs. With more people returning to the land; the introduction of improved methods and more adequate shipping facilities, it is hoped that the above figure will be greatly increased in the future.

Tinian has a commercial farming venture which is headed by three Americans. It is a 900 acre farm leased from the Trust Territory. The farm is of the truck-garden type and raises produce for export to Saipan and Guam.

Agriculture on the off islands with the exception of Rota, which exports a small amount of produce to Guam, is on a subsistence level.

The Saipan Agriculture Station was founded 1 January 1948. It is located on the Southwestern side of Saipan on 18 acres of gently sloping land, well protected by windbreaks. It is bordered by an all-weather coral road and introduction, propagation and distribution of beneficial flora and the introduction of desirable fauna. Already planted at the Station are Bluefield and Chinese Banana strains from Hawaii, as well as choice selections from other Islands of the Marianas group. In addition, solo Papaya from Hawaii are planted in sufficient quantity for free distribution to native farmers. The entire border of the Station has been planted to selected coconuts. Actual construction of buildings and access roads at the Station have been completed.

The prime project for the Station for the year 1948 is the re-introduction to Saipan, Tinian and Rota, of at least 50,000 coconuts. Due to inadequate shipping facilities, only 10,000 have been collected to date. Re-introduction of coconuts is now considered feasible due to the introduction from Java of a parasitic wasp to combat the destructive Marianas Coconut Beetle.

COPRA

Probably the major source of income for the Northern Marianas will be the production of copra. During the German and Japanese regimes; extensive coconut plantations were established on Anataha, Sarigan, Alamagan, Pagan, Agrihan and Asuncion.

To date, we have been successful in re-establishing native colonies on Alamagan (Chamorroan), and Agrihan (Carolinian). They have been established on the islands twelve months. The scarcity and inadequacy of ships made available to Civil Administration Saipan, has retarded our whole economic and agricultural program. Pagan, the most important undeveloped island left in the Northern Marianas, has been set aside as a bombardment area and is consequently denied the natives. This is a great waste of important native resources as the island has three large coconut plantations, a harbor, a stone jetty, and was a center for tuna fishing industry under Japanese rule.

FISHING

FISHING (continued)

The fishing fleet is composed of 4 Japanese Sampans, 3 motor boats and 6 pulling boats. The average monthly catch is about 18,000 pounds, consisting of tuna, reef fish and longusta. The amount of the catch is entirely dependent on available transport to ship fish to Guam.

Some commercial fishing also done in the Bonin Island, which again is dependent on transportation. The average monthly catch being about 2000 pounds of dried fish.

An indeterminate amount of subsistence fishing is done on Saipan, the other islands of the district and in the Bonin Isles.

COMMERCE

Saipan, Tinian and Rota are serviced by three (3) small commercial Steamship lines, the Marianas Steamship Co., the Guam-Pacific Line Inc and the Far East Fisheries. These three lines are of course in addition to Naval Vessels. Trading is carried on with other districts of the Trust Territory, Guam and United States.

IMPORTS - EXPORTS

Imports - Known imports average about \$25,000.00 per month. This is composed mostly of food stuff and wearing apparel. There is an indeterminate amount of goods ordered by mail from the United States and from Guam. It is estimated that this will aggregate about five to ten thousand dollars per month.

Exports - Exports total between twenty and twenty-five thousand dollars per month. This is composed of copra, fish, farm products and Soy Sauce.

Trade Stores - There are twenty-three Trade Stores on Saipan and two on Rota. These stores deal in foodstuffs and general merchandise. They average about \$30,000.00 sales per month.

Private Business - Private Business is represented by cobblers, restaurants, ice cream shops, jewelers, laundress, tailor shops and all business other than trade stores. Their average monthly sales are about \$31,000.00

FINANCE AND SUPPLY

During the first and second quarters, the Civil Administration Unit, Saipan, was suballotted the sum of \$101,600.00 under the appropriation number 1790320 IGN 1949. In addition to this amount, a total of \$11,500.00 was granted in non-appropriated funds from the Treasury, DepHiComTerPacIs.
