## FOURTH GUAM LEGISLATURE 1958 (SECOND) Regular Session

Resolution No. 367

Relative to requesting Congress of the United States to cause the political reintegration of the Marianas Islands by incorporating the islands of the northern Marianas within the governmental framework of the territory of Guam.

1	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:
. 2	WHEREAS, the indigenous inhabitants of the Marianas
.3	Islands are all of one race, known as Chamorros, having a common
4	language, religion, social customs and traditions and, until
5	the end of the Spanish-American War, a common history; and
6	WHEREAS, as a result of this war, the island of Guam, the
7	capital and seat of government of the Marianas Islands, was
8	politically separated from the remainder of their sister islands,
9	becoming a possession of the United States, and the remaining
10	islands, being of no further use to Spain since their capital and
11	largest population center had been severed, were shortly thereafter
12	sold to Imperial Germany, which sale demonstrates forcefully the
13	fact that in the minds of the Spanish rulers of the Marianas all of
14	the islands were interdependent; and
15	WHEREAS, the separation of Guam from the other islands
16	inhabited by its kinsmen resulted in over half a century of anxiety
17	and uncertainty regarding the fate of fellow Chamorros whose
18	history since that date has been a tragic one of shifting allegiance
19	from flag to flag, until their liberation from the Japanese in 1944,
20	which separation has meant hardship and tragedy for those with close
21	relatives on the other islands and which separation to this date
22	continues; and
23	WHEREAS, this rupture of the Marianas Islands has always
24	been believed by the older inhabitants of Guam to have been the
25	result only of an oversight on the part of the United States which
26	did not realize at the time of the signing of the Treaty of Paris
27	how essential the other islands of the Marianas were to the future

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1	stability and economy of Guam; and
2	WHEREAS, despite this unfortunate and perhaps accidenta
3	division of one race, the people of the Marianas have never lost
4	hope that a day would come when all the Chamorros once again will
5	be reunited within a homogeneous political and economic union
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8	of the Allied Nations, Guam and the other Marianas Islands were
9	liberated from their common oppressor with the result that all of
10	these islands were placed under the control of the United States,
11	thereby assuring to the Chamorro race the priceless opportunity
12	for self-government of their choosing within the American framework
13	and and
14	WHEREAS, as a result of the conflict attendant upon the
15	Second World War, the United Nations was born, which organization
16	had as one of its primary purposes the self-government, and self-
17	determination of all the peoples of the world, and to that end
18	instituted a trusteeship arrangement whereby Great Powers undertook
19	to assure such self-determination to peoples under their trust, the
20	purposes of which trust are set forth in Article 76 of the United
21	Nations' Charter:
22	"Article 76. The basic objectives of the trustee-
23	ship system, in accordance with the purposes of the
24	United Nations laid down in Article 1 of the present
25	Charter, shall be:
26	a. to further international peace and security;
27	b. to promote the political, economic, social
<b>2</b> 8	and educational advancement of the inhabitants
29	of the trust territories, and their progressive
30	development towards self-government or
31.	independence as may be appropriate to the
32	particular circumstances of each territory and
33	its peoples and the freely commend

1	of the peoples concerned, and as may be
2	provided by the terms of each trusteeship
3	agreement;
4	c. to encourage respect for human rights and for
5	fundamental freedoms for all without distinction
6	as to races, sex, language, or religion, and to
7	encourage recognition of the interdependence
8	of the peoples of the world; and
9	b. to ensure equal treatment in social, economic
10	and commercial matters for all members of
11	the United Nations and their nationals, and
12	also equal treatment for the latter in the
13	administration of justice, without prejudice
14	to the attainment of the foregoing objective
15	and subject to the provisions of Article 80;"
16	and
17	WHEREAS, the United States was given the trusteeship of
18	these northern Marianas Islands as part of its responsibilities in
19	the Pacific as a Great Power and as recognition of its decisive
20	role in the liberation of such islands; and
21	WHEREAS, the trusteeship agreement entered into by the
22	United States with the United Nations contains within it the follow-
23	ing Article 9:
24	"ARTICLE 9
25	The administering authority shall be entitled
26	to constitute the trust territory into a customs,
27	fiscal, or administrative union or federation with
28	other territories under United States jurisdiction
29	and to establish common services between such terri-
30	tories and the trust territory where such measures
31	are not inconsistent with the basic objectives of
32	the International Trusteeship System and with the
33	terms of this agreement":

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    which article indicates that the Northern Marianas may be instituted
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    into the territory of Guam as part of an administrative union or
    federation, since such a measure would not be inconsistent with
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     the basic objectives of the trusteeship system but would indeed
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     be the culmination of the desires of the inhabitants of all the
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    Marianas; and
             - WHEREAS, this Legislature has received from time to time
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     letters and communications from various residents and leaders of
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     the Island of Saipan, the largest and most populated isle in the
     Marianas otherthan Guam, which have stated unequivocally the desires
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     of the people of Saipan to be reunited with their kinsmen of Guam;
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     and
               WHEREAS, a favorable response to this resolution and the
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     resulting reunion of the Chamorro race would clearly demonstrate
     to the rest of the world the good faith and high moral purpose of
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     the United States and the manifest advantages of the American system
     of government, since after less than 15 years of only the most
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     rudimentary type of American government the people of the Northern
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     Marianas desire nothing more than closer integration with the
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     United States and greater self-government within the framework
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     of the American territory of Guam, thereby destroying the myth
     of American colonialism and fortifying the traditional American
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     concept of self-determination for all races and peoples; and
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               WHEREAS, the benefits of such a reunification of the
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     Marianas, aside from the spiritual and moral uplift to be derived
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     therefrom, would also mean a more viable economy for both Guam
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      and the other islands, with the increased trade and travel meaning
      more prosperity for all and enabling Guam to become less dependent
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      on a military economy; and
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            WHEREAS, this aspiration that all the people of the Marianas
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      be reunited within the framework of the American system of free and
      representative government is a hope that can be shared by freedom-
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      loving people all over the world, since the underlying desire is to
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      permit the government of the Marianas Islands to be "of the people,
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by the people, and for the people"; now terefore be it 1. RESOLVED, that the Fourth Guam Legislature does hereby 2 on behalf of the people of Guam and in sympathy with the people of 3 all the Marianas Islands respectfully request and petition the Con-4 gress of the United States to cause the northern Marianas Islands 5 to be incorporated within the framework of the territory of Guam; 6 7 and be it further RESOLVED, that this resolution do also serve as express-8 ing the deep gratitude and appreciation of all the people of the 9 10 Marianas to the United States and to its Armed Forces for their strength and power which delivered the Islands from the oppressor 11 12 and two made it possible for this resolution to be entertained, since the eventual reunification of the Marianas is a goal that can 13 14 be reached and is desired to be reached only under the American 15 flag; and be it further RESOLVED, that the Speaker certify to and the Legislative 16 17 Secretary attest the adoption hereof and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the President of the United States; 18 to the President of the Senate, to the Speaker of the House of 19 Representatives, to the Chairmen of the Committees on Interior and 20 Insular Affairs, Senate and House, to the Secretary of the Interior, 21 to the Secretary of Defense, to Commander Naval Forces Marianas, 22 to the Chairman of the Saipan Congress, and to the Governor of 23

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Guam.
