The major activity during this month was the evacuation of 5,266 civilians. This work was carried on in a very orderly manner with excellent wooperation on the part of the civilian council. All population from Camp Churo has been reelocated in the three new camp areas. Work is progressing very rapidly of the wrecking and removal of the old houses.

  Personnel. The evidence leading to their apprehension was found by native
  policemen.
- (f) Due to the nearly complete evacuation, all activities of the Public Safety Department have shrunk considerable. The new brig, due to lack of Naval Personnel, was abondoned and its functions transferred back to the old brig in the carry.
- (g) Every effort is being made to put this department on a permanent basis for the future civilian population of this island.
- (h) The fire trucks were used successfully to control the burning of camp debris.

### 15. PUBLIC WELFARE.

(a)Welfare.

Due to the reduced population of Camp Churo the Welfare Department has ceased to function as a separate unit. Welfare is now under the supervision of the Civilian Council.

(b) Rationing.

Special ration bonus ration cards were issued to 955 civilian workers.

16. PUBLIC WORKS.

No new construction was attempted due to the use of all the skilled personnel in tearing down the old camp. However routine maintenance work was continued.

### 17. MILITARY GOVERNMENT PERSONNEL.

- (a) On 16 March 1946, Lt. Comdr. William B. CAMERON, USNR, Executive officer, succeeded Comdr. Roland W. KENNEY, USNR, as Commanding Officer and Deputy Chief of Military Government. Comdr. KENNEY departed to attend the Naval Island Administration School, Stanford University, Palto Alto, California. Lt. John T. HUGHES, USNR, was appointed Executive Officer. No officers were reported in during this period. No officers were transferred for discharge on points this month. The following were detached for further assignment: Lt. Alan M. MACQUARRIE, USNR, and Comdr. Roland W. KENNEY, USNR. Officer strength as of 31 March 1946 was 7, including one on temporary duty from Island Command, Tillan for duty with Military Government.
- (b) The total strength of the U.S.C.C. attached to Military Government is 9.
- (c) Enlisted. There were no men received during this period. Six men were returned to the Continental United States for discharge. Seven men were transferred to Military Government Unit, at Yap. Three men went home for rehabilitation leave. The total men advanced in rating were 8. Inlisted strength as of 31 March 1946 was 41.
