2. NATIVE GOVERNMENT AND ADMINISTRATION:

During May, the uncertainty as to the future of the Okinawans made it feasible to maintain the status quo and very little changes were effected.

The Camp Council requested permission for the refurbishing of of their civilian cemetery and the holding of an inter-camp field day. After reviewing their plans, permission was granted and work was started.

The Camp Council was also given permission to direct the native police force in purely local matters.

9. CUSTODY AND ADMINISTRATION OF PROPERTY:

As per Commander Marianas dispatch 270639 of April, on 7 May title to all Military Government funds and supplies was transferred to N.A.B. Tinian.

10. AGRICULTURE:

(a) The farm co-operative was dissolved, its funds transferred to the Camp Council, and the farmers moved into the camp area. This was done to supply the demand for outside labor and also in preparation for evacuation. The Camp Council sends out harvesters periodically to MG farm areas and U.S.C.C. farm areas to collect vegetables for camp distribution.

(b) Livestock;

As per Commander Marianas letter, serial 5868 dated.l May 1946, all livestock were transferred to the U.S.C.C. The U.S.C.C. turned back 50 pigs to MG to be slaughtered for food purposes for the natives.

2. Miscellaneous heavy equipment. Transferred as excess to various other units were a Mobile Machine Shop, two Dewalt saws, a bench grinder, miscellaneous pipe, carpenter tools, and electrical equipment.

17. <u>MILITARY GOVERNMENT PERSONNEL:</u>

- (a) Officers: One (1) officer, Ens. D. G. VOLKMAN, USNR, was transferred to the United States for discharge on points this month. Ens. Leonard RUSH, USNR, remains as Commanding Officer and Deputy Chief of Military Government. Ens. Robert Krauss BOSCH, USNR, remains as Executive and Personnel Officer.
- (b) Enlisted Men: There were no men received during this period. Sixteen men were returned to the Continental United States for discharge. Two men were returned to the Continental United States for rehabiliation leave. Two men were transferred to Guam for hospitalization. One man was advanced in rating. Enlisted strength as of 31 May 1946.was 9. Notification has been received of the coming of one STM3c to this unit.

(c) Military Government Hospital No. #204:

Officer strength - 2; Enlisted strength - 3. Lt. E. D. LEVY, USNR, was transferred to the United States for discharge. Lt.(jg) (MC) P. W. SCHUESSLER, USNR, succeeded Lt. E. D. LEVY, USNR, as Officer in Charge.

(d) Personnel Temporarily Attached:

3 - AGF Nisei (Interpreters).

(e) Military Government Personnel includes 2 reserve officers - both of whom urgently desire demobilization, 3 temporarily attached Nisei - one of whom is leaving immediately and the others probably this summer, 5 reserve enlisted men - all of whom desire demobilization, and 4 Regular Navy men. Of the latter, one's enlistment is up in July, one is due for re-enlistment leave before August, one is due for rotation (20 months) in September. Therefore only one enlisted man can be expected to remain here for any length of time. It is requested that this matter be given consideration.
