Subj: Land Requirements in the Saipan District of the Trust Territory

1. The Commander in Chief, U. S. Pacific Fleet, by reference (a), requested COMNAVMARIANAS to survey certain land in the Saipan District for retention by the Air Force and further to correct the index of map listings on current maps delineating land to be retained by the military services as shown on enclosure (1) which has been revised.

2. In accordance with reference (b), CINCPACFLT, by reference (c), requested COMNAVMARIANAS to forward to the Chief, Bureau of Yards and Docks via CINCPACFLT the following information for each area to be retained for military use in the Saipan District:

a. Number of acres in each area under:

- (1) Private ownership
- (2) Public ownership

b. Present status and estimated date of completion of land appraisals for privately owned areas.

3. All of the land areas which have been approved now have a completed perimeter survey except three new areas which, it is understood, the Air Force will soon request. To indicate the status of perimeter surveys on the approved areas, the following is submitted:

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a. Present status:

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4. The following general statements are submitted to indicate the land situation on Saipan as known by COMINCHVIAFARABAU:

a. All property records on Saipan lack adequate notes and boundary descriptions for determining property limits.

b. Mariana Area Dwg No. 10240, a cadastral map of Saipan, delineates all available property information and is based on five pre-World War II Japanese cadastral maps. The scale on MA Dwg No. 10240 is too small to permit usable acreage estimates on individual lots.

c. Military land requirements have been overlaid on MA Dwg No. 10240 in order to permit much overall estimates of total government and private property.

d. It is roughly estimated that private property in military areas will run from 10 to 30 percent of the total acreage.

5. Since it is not known what degree of land survey is required, the following two cases are presented to indicate the problems involved:

a. Surveys and property information similar to that which has been provided for military acquisitions and condemnations on Guam:

- (1) Firming up and extending survey control.
- (2) Surveying private property and making property maps.
- (3) Compiling severances for appraisal and legal purposes.

Predicated upon the use of COMINCHVIAFARABAU (Base Development) civilian personnel, it is estimated that to perform the above type survey, one and one half years will be required at an approximate cost of \$75,000.

b. If DUSAID will permit settlement of property claims by negotiation rather than by use of definite acreages, the following could be followed:

(1) Appraisers from the Property Administration Division, with reconnaissance survey men from the Survey and Mapping Branch, could compile lists of all property interests completely within military areas.

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
