1. In compliance with reference (a), the following report on administration of civil government in the Saipan District, is submitted.

2. SECTION I - GENERAL

a. On 6-9 January the Annual Material and Administrative Inspection of the U.S. Naval Administration Unit, Saipan District was conducted. The Chief Inspector was Rear Admiral W. B. ANMON, Commander Naval Forces, Marianas and the Assistant Chief Inspector was Captain O. A. WESCHE, Assistant Chief of Staff for Logistics, Commander Naval Forces Marianas. The report of the Annual Material Inspection indicated the overall material condition of the Unit and recommended a grade of UNSATISFACTORY. A grade of SATISFACTORY was recommended for the Annual Administration Inspection. There were three items in the Administrative report considered excellent by the inspecting group - professional medical service, disbursing, and appearance of the personnel when paraded for inspection. Both reports have been submitted to COMMAVMARIANAS via this command. Endorsements indicating corrective action will be submitted as soon as possible.

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3. SECTION II - NAVAD UNIT

- a. Administration There has been no appreciable change in the work-load during January. The administrative department processed 159 letters; 169 controlled pieces of correspondence; and a total of 83 monthly, quarterly, semi-annual and annual reports during the month of January.
- b. <u>Personnel</u> LT J. F. MURPHY, MC, USNR relieved LT J. W. LCVDER, MC, USNR as Senior Medical Officer and Public Health Officer, Saipan District. The reporting of ENS L. K. COTTER, USNR, has alleviated several of the collateral duties of the assigned officers allowing them more time to devote to their primary duties. The enlisted personnel situation was eased somewhat during the past month with the reporting of the following ratings: BUl, CD1, BM1, YN1, SK2, SW2, CSSN.
- c. Operations There were 14 round trips made by logistic aircraft during January. The M/V HOPE made two trips to Guam for Logistic Support and made one field trip to the Northern Mariana Islands. Additional logistic support was provided by the USS BANNER (AKL-25) 3 trips and the USS MANDAMK (ATA-204) 2 trips. The message center handled 3923 messages which constitutes a six persent (6%) increase over the average. The average number of messages handled for the past six months was 3713 monthly. The fire department investigated two fires and fire fighting equipment was dispatched to both. No structural damage was reported.
- d. Public Morks The Public Morks Department expended \$41,459.74 during January. A breakdown of expenditures in labor and materials by the various shops is as follows:

- (1) The Tri-Annual Physical Inventory of Plant Property Class 3 has been completed subject to approval of a request for adjustment submitted by NAVAD Saipan to the Comptroller General on NAVAD Saipan letter serial 177 of 3 February 1958.

5. SECTION IV - CIVIL ADMINISTRATION

a. Legal and Public Safety:

(1) <u>Personnel</u> - The territory of Guan has commenced a Police In-Service Training School for their police. The school is full-time and is of six (6) weeks duration. It will be repeated through most of calendar year 1958. An oral invitation to attend this course was extended by the Guan Director of Fublic Safety to the Saipan Insular Constabulary. The

Naval Administrator has forwarded this invitation to Commander Naval Forces Marianas requesting that this invitation be confirmed in writing. It is expected that one (1) Constabularyman will attend each course.

- (2) Fire Protection There were only two (2) fires. Both were brush fires and caused no property damage or personal injuries.
- (3) Law Enforcement There were 34 arrests; 42 prosecutions for traffic offenses, 41 of which resulted in convictions, and one was acquitted. Three (3) driver's licenses were revoked and one (1) suspended. There were ten (10) prosecutions for misdemeanors, other than traffic offenses, nine (9) of which resulted in convictions and one (1) an acquittal.
- (4) Prison Prison population was fourteen (14) of 1 January and ten (10) on 31 January 1958. There were no female prisoners. Prisoners worked almost exclusively on the New Oleai School. Two (2) paroles were granted by the Naval Administrator.
- (5) Contracts and Contracts Idministration No scrap was shipped from the Saipan District during January. The M/V CHICOT is scheduled to arrive 1 February 1958 for scrap loading at Saipan and Tinian. The CHICOT will arrive empty and is expected to load approximately 3000 long tons.
- (6) Judiciary and Courts The Saipan Court of Appeals (Trial Division) net the week of 6 January 1958. Five (5) civil cases were tried. One hundred and thirty-six (136) criminal and eight (8) district court cases were reviewed and approved.
- (7) Legislation Executive Order No. 19, dated 21 October 1957, providing for naturalization of certain classes of persons as a citizen of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, was received during January (See enclosure (3)). The Naval Administrator submitted proposed naturalization procedures to Commander Naval Forces Marianas for approval.
- (8) Juvenile Delinquency Five (5) complaints have been prepared for prosecution of parents who are alleged to have knowingly permitted their children to be absent from school without good cause.

b. Internal Affairs:

- (1) Agriculture The unusual showers resulting from Typhoon Ophelia were very beneficial to this District. The Navy cattle pasture along Beach Road has been cleared and all debris burned. It is hoped it will serve as a model to all Saipanese Ranchers.
- (2) <u>Labor</u> There are 259 ceiling employees and 144 contract laborers (Contract No. N6119(61574)-1435).

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SECTION IV - CIVIL ADMINISTRATION (Continued)

(3) Vital Statistics and Census - Each year, as of 30 June, the Trust Territory of the Facific Islands is requested to submit a report to the Trusteeship Council of the United Nations. A portion of the report consists of an annual census. This year the Saipan District will use the same census forms that are being completed by the rest of the Trust Territory. The information required for the coming census is more exacting than that previously furnished and test runs on Saipan indicate that it will require 45 to 60 minutes per family when all members are present. Census taking is underway on Tinian. There were thirty (30) births and three (3) deaths (Include Saipanese only) during the month of January.

c. Education:

- (1) The Educational Administrator and Superintendent of Elementary Education attended an Educational conference held at Truk. It was called by the Director of Education for the Trust Territory. Meetings and discussions were held in the areas of elementary schools, intermediate schools, Pacific Island Central School and Higher Education.
- (2) The Teacher-Supervisor spent four days working with the school in Tinian. She found the classroom instruction progressing satisfactorily. Problems concerning the school were discussed with Mayor and Naval Representative. While the Supervisor was there she was able to gain the aid of the Medical Department for complete physical examinations for all school children. They also gave deworming and delousing treatments to all pupils.
- (3) The Principal of the Saipan Intermediate School made an inspection of all the Northern Island Schools. He found the schools well organized with the quality of instruction very good.
- (4) During the month it was possible to start giving complete physical examinations to all elementary students. These were being given by a Medical Practitioner and Fublic Health Nurse assigned to work with the Municipality.
- (5) Another textbook was translated from English to Chamorro for use in the Primary grades. 500 of these books were reproduced by the Primary typewriter owned by the Department. The illustrations were also produced at the school. After printing on our memograph machine, the books were locally bound. Presently in the process of being translated are ten (10) additional texts.
- (6) As an integral part of the curriculum, two field trips were taken by student groups from the Intermediate School. These trips were to the power plant, communications center and the Agricultural Station.

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- (7) In order to bring the Intermediate School Library more up to date approximately 200 books have been ordered.
- (8) Because of the age of the buildings at the Intermediate School and the rapidly deteriorating condition of the buildings the scheduled number of fire drills has been stepped up to one every two weeks.
- (9) During January the students of the Intermediate School staged a political campaign in order to determine the Officers for Student Council. The democratic process was observed from the holding of rally's and speech making to secret ballots.

d. Land and Claims:

(1) General:

673 grant deeds on the damage exchange program have been forwarded to the Land and Claims Administrator (APMO) for execution. Upon receipt of the executed deeds the Naval Administrator will record and deliver the same to individuals and accept and record 547 quit claim deeds in exchange.

The Land and Claims Administrator is preparing a license for the use of the Island of Pagan for the benefit of the Government of the Trust Territory. The license will be for a term ending 30 June 1961.

Concrete markers have been placed on all the lot corners of South Garapan and Tuntan Mutcho subdivisions. All village lots in subdivisions on Saipan and Tinian now have markers delineating property lines.

The District Agriculturist with a representative of the Land Office inspected fourteen (14) parcels of Trust Territory land leased to individuals for grazing purpose on the island of Saipan. Twelve (12) lessee were satisfactorily complying with the requirements of their leases, the other two lessee were advised of their shortgomings and requested to correct same.

(2) Land Management and Homesteads:

The Homestead Inspection Board made an inspection of twenty-four (24) Tinian Homesteads. These homesteads are those that were initiated under the old homestead agreements and were extended for a three (3) year "proving up" period. The findings of the Board are contained in enclosure (4). In addition to the inspection, the President of the Board, the District Agriculturist, gave advice to the homesteaders on good farming and grazing practices.

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SECTION IV - CIVIL DMINISTRATION (Continued)

A formal resolution concerning the establishment of area requirements for the use of honestcad community sites on Saipan and Tinian has been forwarded to the Commander in Chief, U. S. Pacific Fleet for approval via the chain of command. Enclosure (5) is a copy of the resolution. A pamphlet containing legal documents and helpful hints to prospective agricultural homestcaders has been compiled and a sample is forwarded as enclosure (6).

The Land and Claims Administrator has advised the Naval Administrator that Mr. C. F. Gleason, Manager, Survey and Mapping Branch of APMO Guam will arrive on Saipan early in February to assist in formulating a field program utilizing photo contour maps for the agricultural homestead descriptions.

e. Public Health and Sanitation:

(1) General - All homes in the Village of Tanapag, approximately sixty (60) in all, were inspected during the reporting month by the Senior Medical Officer, Tublic Health Visiting Nurse, and personnel from the Sanitation Force. Home cleanliness, child care problems, and home sanitation measures were inspected, advised on and defects or discrepancies were pointed out. Ten (10) children and one (1) adult were admitted for observation and diagnostic studies as the result of this inspection. As of 31 January 1958 all but three (3) children have been discharged from hospitalization. Primary cause for hospitalization was attributed to ascaris infestation and dermatitis conditions.

During this reporting period forty (40) housemaids employed by NAVAD families were inspected and thirty-seven (37) reissued health cards. Three (3) maids had suspicious findings on chest x-rays and were admitted for observation and further diagnostic studies.

(2) Hospital and In-Patient Treatment - During January the average daily census was 64 patients. There were 127 admissions and 90 discharges during the period. There were 4 deaths, no stillbirths and 33 live births during the reporting period. Cause of the four deaths were as follows:

(3) <u>Dispensaries</u>, <u>Clinics</u> and <u>Out-Patient Treatment</u> - The satellite dispensaries and the out-patient department of the hospital had 3,277 out-patient visits.

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SECTION IV -- CIVIL ADMINISTRATION (Continued)

(4) Visiting Nurse and Home Care -

- (a) The visiting nurse visited all homes in the Village of Tanapag accompanied by the Senior Medical Officer. See Section IV.e.(1).
- (b) During the reported period the visiting nurse conducted a dewerning program for children of the ages 1 to 2 in Chalan Kanoa Village. Two hundred seventy-seven (277) children of this age group were dewormed.
- (c) San Roque Elementary School was visitied by the Tublic Health Nurse and nunicipal sanitarian and all children were examined for lice infestation. One hundred twenty-four (124) of the 138 children examined were found to be infested with head lice.
- (d) Twenty-two (22) family contacts were referred to the station hospital for PTD tests and x-ray studies by the visiting nurse during her routine follow-up checks.
- (e) The Chalan Kanoa Elementary School was visited by a medical practitioner and the Tublic Health Murse and three (3) classrooms, a total of ninety (90) students, were given complete physical examinations and a school medical record established in each case. This will be a continuing program until all school children have a complete physical examination and a school medical record established.

(5) Sanitation and Treventive Medicine:

- (a) <u>Mater Supply</u> There were two (2) positive samples out of 72 samples collected. One of these was from Isley Reservoir and was taken before chlorination. Mater was properly chlorinated before release to the distribution system. The other positive sample was in the distribution system in the Village of Oleai. It was positive in one tube only and is considered insignificant by U. S. Tublic Health Service Standards. There was a water outage in the Village of San Roque of one (1) days duration on 22 January.
- (b) Food inspection One hundred and nine (109) business establishments were inspected and their annual health permits renewed. During this inspection five (5) written and nine (9) oral warnings for correction of insanitary conditions were issued. These were corrected before renewal of permits were made. No new business establishments were inspected. Four (4) food handlers were given pre-employment physical examinations at the hospital and issued food handlers health cards.

f. Municipality of Saipan:

(1) General - The District Commissioners from San Antonio, Oleai, Tanapag and San Roque have been advised to submit their financial statements to the Internal Affairs Department. These will be included in further reports.

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- (2) Tersonnel. The nine carpenters employed by the Municipality to complete the Olcai School Project have been released.
- (3) Public Works Four of the seventeen man noles that remained uncovered at the end of December, have not been completed due to a shortage of cement.
- (4) Congress and Legislation Congress held two (2) special sessions in addition to one regular monthly meeting. During these sessions, the Congress acted on the following items:
- (a) Bill No. 10, an ordinance to prevent the straying of domestic animals was passed by the Congress and approved by the Mayor. On 29 January 1958 it was forwarded to the Naval Administrator for action. This bill is being studied by the Mayal Administrator.
- (b) The Saipan Congress forwarded to the Naval Administrator its recommendations for delegates and alternates to the South Pacific Conference.
- (c) Resolution No. 9 to amend the Municipal Charter to provide for the election of a commissioner for each of the five (5) inhabited islands to the North of Saipan was defeated by a unanimous vote. From floor discussions, it appeared that the following were the reasons for its defeat:
- l. Persons working and residing on the islands North of Saipan are deemed to be residents of Saipan and are considered to be on the Northern Marianas on a temporary rotation basis only. It is felt that people of such islands are adequately represented by representatives of the Northern Marianas Development Company. There is one of these representatives for each of the Islands. Although such representatives are appointed by the Company, the Company appoints only those men who are acceptable to the people.
- 2. Election of Commissioners will result in divided authority and responsibility between Company representatives and commissioners.
- (d) Bill No. 5, an ordinance to control alcoholic beverages was partially reviewed.
- (e) Municipal Ordinance No. 24, an ordinance to revise and to compile in one ordinance all laws respecting nunicipal taxes, business and trade license, and license fees was approved by the Naval Edministrator on 10 January 1958. (See enclosure (7)).
- (f) Municipal Ordinance No. 25, an ordinance to impose and levy an import tax for the Municipality of Saipan. The Naval Idministrator advised the Congress that the subject of import taxes is currently being considered by the High Commissioner and the Commander Naval Forces Marianas.

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SECTION IV - CIVIL ADMINISTRATION (Continued)

The Naval Administrator stated that although he approved of the ordinarce in principle, he considered it advisable to defer action until receipt of recommendations from higher authority (See Enclosure (8)).

g. Municipality of Tinian:

- (1) Cornercial Operations The Tinian Formers have transplanted many thousands of Tassion and Tobacco seedlings in addition to several hundred coffee seedlings. Than are presently underway to fill the green house beds with new seeds in preparation for the coming rainy season. Considerable new land is being cultivated and a bumper crop is expected for 1958.
- (2) Public Health and Sanitation The dispensary treated 220 patients in the outpatient department. The Saipan Health Inspector visited Tinian and sheeked all business establishments and made suggestions as to their improvement. A cleanup campaign in the village will be held in the near future to remove all rubbish in front of the homes.
- (3) Troblets .. decrease in the population of Tinian was noted on compl tion of the annual census. Hew industries and farming advancements must be developed to hold the people on Tinian. The visiting of children on other islands who are attending school and the uncertainty of shipping produce off Tinian is a contributing factor to this decrease.

6. SECTION V - SPECIAL PROJECTS

- a. Cattle Breeding and Development Troject The months work on this project has been limited to routine care, fense and pasture maintenance, and a few cases of veterinary assistance.
- b. Cannibal Snail Troject The activity of the cannibal snail is diminishing as the rain decreases and the dry season progresses.
- c. Copra Stabilization Fund The M/V HOTE made one trip to the Northern Islands during the month and collected seventy (70) tons of copra. There is now a total of one hundred and ten (110) short tons warehoused and ready for marketing.

PECORD OF PROCEEDINGS HOMESTEAD INSPECTION BOAPD - 1958

Pursuant to MAVAD SAIPAN letter serial 106 of 22 January 1958 and a letter from the Land Office dated 20 January 1958, the Homestead inspection Board met at the Tinian Administration Building, Tinian, Mariana Islands at 1100 hours on 27 January 1958 to set the agenda for the annual inspection.

- 1. The Homesteaders were invited to attend the Board meeting on 22 January 1958. They were informed of the Board agenda and invited and encouraged to ask questions. The meeting adjourned to commence the inspection of the homesteads as listed by the Land Title Officer.
- 2. The following homesteads showed great improvement over last year by planting of revenue and subsistence crops, clearing of land, and the addition of some livestock.
 - # 1 Posa T. Cruz Large area of garden and subsistence crops, 80 coconut trees, chickens, pigs.
 - # 5 Luis C. Villagomez Large cleared area, many garden and revenue crops, 400 coconut trees, 400 bananas, chickens.
 - # 6 Henry Hofschneider, Sr. 410 coconut trees, citrus, large field chinese cabbage, corn, large cleared area.
 - # 7 Eugenio V. Tenorio 3000 Tomatoes, 300 cantaloupe, large field sweet potatoes.
 - # 30 Jesus P. Pangelinan Large area subsistence crops. 350 coconuts, 800 taro, tapioca, corn, rotates garden areas.

- # 59 Segundo Castro Large fields of corn, sweet potatoes. cantaloupe, and several cows.
- # 66 Juan M. King New fence, Medium fields of sweet potato, taro, corn, 4 mango, cattle, pigs.
