Subj: Petition dated February 13, 1959, from Micronesian Metals & Equipment Company Employees Association to CINCPACFLT

- 1. The undersigned during the past several days has been informally gathering information and background on subject petition, with some surprising results, which are as follows:
- (a) The actual preparation of the petition was by Vicente Goguefrom information furnished him by the four persons who signed the petition as officers of the Employees Association. Mr. Goguestates that he prepared several rough drafts which the Association Officers presumably took to Mr. Robert R. Hill for perusal before the final draft was made. It is Mr. Gogue's belief that Mr. Hill is entirely cognizant of the petition and that it met with his approval.
- (b) The odd fact was immediately noted that the man who has the largest labor claim against Micro, Joaquin D. Cepeda, (\$1258.78), did not sign the petition. When Mr. Cepeda was contacted he stated that nobody had presented the petition to him for signature; that he had only heard that one was being circulated. He stated that he was the oldest employe of Micro on Saipan in length of service and that if a Micro Employees Association was in existence he certainly should have known about it.
- (c) Mr. Pedro Capileo (NavAd 13 years) was asked if he was a member of the Micro Employees Association. He denied and stated he had never heard of such a group. When shown his signature on the petition he was very surprised and claimed he did not know what he was signing; that a Micro foreman asked for his signature on a piece of paper including other signatures and no explanation was given as to what he was signing.
- (d) Six NavAd employees of the Electric Shop, whose length of service ranges from the lowest of two years to twelve years, were jointly interviewed and asked if they were members of the Micro Employees Association. They stated they were not members and never heard of such an Association. When shown their signatures on the petition and it was read to them, they were very indignant. They stated that one of Micro's foremen approached them at work one morning and asked them to add their signatures to a list of others on a piece of paper explaining to them that if they signed they could expect their money from Micro in from two to three weeks. They jointly denied knowledge of ever having seen the basic petition.



- (e) Joaquin Santos (NavAd Fire Department) states that he was approached by one of Micro's foremen for his signature on what he thought was a petition to the United Nations. He was informed that if he did not sign the paper he could never get his money from Micro. He states that he is not a member of the Micro Employees Association and has never before heard of the group.
- 2. A recapitulation of the current employment status of the fifty Saipanese signing the petition indicates that only nine of them can be classified as being unemployed, even though employment opportunities do exist on Saipan.

- 3. It is the writer's opinion that (a) The Petitioners do not represent a true list of Micro employees but only those who were part-time employees on boat loadings. (b) That no person interviewed knew exactly what they were signing. (c) That the name "Micronesian Metal & Equipment Co., Inc., Employees Association" was concocted solely for the purposes of this petition. (d) That Saipanese are extremely gullible:
- 4. Jose S. Sablan, President of the Board of Directors of the Micro Employees Association, was interviewed regarding the petition. Jose's attention was invited to the inconsistency of the petition and to its actual wording. He was appalled as to how his actual desires had appeared in English. He states that what he intended in the petition was this "Please, Mr. Admiral, will you permit Micro Metals to continue on Saipan. We know enough of the financial condition of this company that if the contract were terminated now we would get nothing if the company is allowed to keep going, we might eventually get some of our money."
