1. In compliance with references (a) and (b), the following report on administration of civil government in the Saipan District is submitted.

2. Section I - General

Starting on 18 December, Saipans! Christmas season opened with festivities at Our Lady of Mount Carmel (Parochial) School followed on successive evenings at the San-Roque, Oleai, Chalankanoa, and Saipan Intermediate Schools. Enclosure (4) presents the programs of the events offered by the schools.

Of particular interest was the presentation by the Saipan Intermediate School of the traditional Chamorro Christmas play "El Borrego" which combines the Nativity Scene with a humorous story about a Saipanese farmers! lost cow. Enclosure (5) is short English language translation of "El Borrego".

3. Section II - Naval Administration Unit

A - Personnel

On 11 December Robert M. Kemp, Lt, MC, USN departed for CONUS. On 23 December John M. O'Lane, Lt., MC, USNR reported for duty from CONUS.

C - Public Works

1. The maintenance program of the Public Works Department expended \$ 48,594.77 in December as follows:

- 2. Training was conducted as follows:
 - a. Safety talks, weekly, in all shops for all employees.
- 3. Safety inspections of all areas were made each month. Corrections have been initiated on all discrepancies noted.

5. Projects

- a. One transformer was installed to provide electric power to a new Saipanese home in the area of Oleai and 6 new water connections were installed during the months of October, November and December. A total of 13 MAN-HOURS was consumed with \$57.05 expended for labor and materials.
- b. The Special brojects, construction of a new cocling tower for Power Plant was completed on 19 November 1959. Replacement of piping from cooling tower to Power Plant is approximately 85 per cent complete.
- c. The Special Project, renovation of Barracks #3, #4 and CPO Quarters was started on 20 November 1959, work is 30 per cent complete.

E - Public Health and Sanitation

4.

1. Hospital and Inpatient Care

a. There were 2 patients admitted to the Station Hospital tubercular section for diagnostic studies, evaluation and treatment. There were 7 arrested tubercular cases discharged to be followed in the clinics under treatment and periodic chest x-rays. As of 31 December 25 tubercular patients were being hospitalized for treatment. This comprises 50% of the inpatient load.

b. The average daily census was 59.2. There were 27 births and 3 stillbirths. There were 75 admissions, 91 discharges, and one transfer to the U. S. Naval Hospital, Guam, M. I. There was one death in Chalan Kanca Village. The causes of the death and stillbirths are as follows:

- 2. Dispensaries, Clinics, and Outpatient Care
- a. The satellite dispensaries on Saipan and the outpatient clinic of the Station Hospital had 3482 visits.
 - b. The Tinian dispensary had 123 visits.
 - 3. Visiting Nurse and home care
- a. The visiting nurses made 27 homes visits which included visits to homes where mothers had nursing infants to give home instruction in infant care and basic foods for weaning. Thirteen cases of chickenpox and 2 cases of mumps were treated by the Fublic Health Nurses.
 - 4. Preventive Medicine and Sanitation
- a. Fifty eight business establishments were inspected and found satisfactory. Two new business establishments were inspected luring the month and were approved for operation.
- b. One thousand one hundred sixty seven homes were inspected during the annual village sanitation inspection.
- c. Forty eight written warnings and 35 verbal warnings were issued during the village inspection.
- d. One thousand one hundred sixty Saipanese were given chest x-rays during the annual chest x-ray survey. Seven hundred twelve children were dewormed during this month.
 - 5. Training
 - a. The Saipanese nurses training program subject was Basic Nursing Procedures; 98 hours of instruction was administered.

5. Section IV - Civil Administration

A - Legal and Fublic Safety

- 1. Fire Protection. There were no fires.
- 2. Law Enforcement. There were 22 traffic offenses prosecuted with 21 convictions and 1 dismissed. Three misdemeanors were prosecuted with 2 convictions and 1 dismissed. There was 1 driver's license suspended.
- 3. Frison. There were 13 prisoners on 1 December and 10 on 31 December. There were no paroles or applications for parole.
- 4. Juvenile Delinquency. Three Juveniles, who were under 14 years of age, were brought before Judge Ada and were admonished in the presence of their parents for committing larceny in 2 different stores. They were also directed to make a full restitution.

B - Internal Affairs

1. Economic Development

a. Agriculture

Dr. W. W. Cantel, OICC MARIANAS Staff Entomoligist, made a routine visit to Saipan and Tinian. He inspected farms on both islands to determine incipient infestations of agricultural pests before they become of economical importance.

The rice experiments at the Agricultural Station have been completed with results as follows:

The two legumes tried experimentally (Alyce Clover and Crotalaria) have both grown well. Seeds are being collected from both plants for further planting as cover and green manure crops.

Two shipments of fruit fly and melon fly parasites were received from the OICC Staff Entomoligist and released on Tinian. Each shipment contained 2500 parasites. These parasites will help control fruit and melon flies that damage commercial and subsistence crops of that island.

One acre of swamp land is being cleared near Lake Susupe by Agriculture Station personnel for experimental and demonstration purposes to ascertain whether the subsurface water is sufficient to provide natural irrigation. If the project is successful, there are about 200 acres of swamp land near the lake that could be used for vegetable production during the dry season.

b. Labor

There were 255 Saipanese ceiling employees, 171 Saipanese contract laborers (contract N6119-1519), and 20 U. S. Civil Service Americans employed by Naval Administration Unit, Saipan during the month.

C - Education

1. General

Christmas programs were presented by the teaching staff and students of each school on consecutive evenings prior to commencement of vacation. Copies of school programs are attached as enclosure (4). The Saipan Intermediate School presented a traditional Chamorro Christmas play entitled "El Borrego" which was so well received by the Saipanese public that a repeat performance was presented.

Twenty-two Saipenese high school students from Guam visited their families on Saipen during the holiday season. Special efforts were exerted by Commander Naval Forces Marianas to provide transportation for these students to and from Saipan,

The South Pacific Commission has confirmed the committment of their Health Education Specialist as an instructor to the 1960 Summer School Program for Saipanese teachers.

The Department of Education is represented in the Naval Administration Unit's softball league this season with a team comprised of Saipanese teachers from both the Intermediate School and the several Elementary Schools.

Junior Red Gross packages were distributed to the school children on the Northern Islands.

2. TAD

The Education Specialist visited the Tinian Elementary School as a followup to a November visit. School supplies and Christmas materials were delivered at that time.

3. Elementary Schools

The Parent Teachers Association of each Elementary School provided refreshments and treats to the children during the schools' Christmas assemblies. The cooperation of the PTA members with school personnel during the past year has been most commendable.

Primary reading materials in the Chamorro language have been forwarded to the Department of Education, Government of Guam, as requested by their Education Consultants.

Individual teacher evaluation and critiques are being conducted by the Education Specialist with Elementary School personnel. As the school approaches mid-term, many problems of teachers not evident at the beginning of the year can now be ascertained and corrected.

4. Intermediate School

The Intermediate School staff has completed a handbook of school and departmental policies and functions for teacher use. Verbal understandings of school policies are now set down for ready reference.

Several films on loan from various sources on the United States have been received by the Intermediate School and are being shown in correlation with regular classes.

Through continued efforts of the students and the Municipality, the Intermediate School has had the brush cleared from its beach areas and highway frontages giving it a much neater appearance. The beach area may be reserved for picnics by responsible groups thus presenting a recreational area for public use.

D - District Land Office

1. General

Mr. C. F. Gleason and Mr. Wayne Stevenson from the Survey and Mapping Section, OICC, Marianas spent three days conferring with Land Office personnel on various aspects of the land program.

The Saipan District Land Advisory Board is scheduled to spend 2 days on Tinian in January. Enclosure (6) is the proposed Agenda and Itinerary.

2. Alienation of land

There were 3 sales of agricultural plots, one of 3.7 hectares sold for \$925.00, one of 1.5 hectares sold for \$464.07, and one of 0.7 hectares sold for \$240.00. There was one village lot of 358 square meters which was sold for \$300.00. None of the sales were between relatives.

3. Land Management and Homesteading

a. Saipan

Eight agricultural homesteads were surveyed and ll prepared for survey. Fifty three agricultural and 44 village permits have been prepared. It is planned to issue these permits in January.

b. Tinian

Twenty agricultural homesteads were described by metes and bounds and are subject to confirmation by future survey. Concrete monuments were placed on all corners of the plots. Fifty five Agricultural and 27 Village Homestead Permits have been prepared and it is planned to issue them in January.

E - Municipality of Saipan

1. Congress and Legislation:

The Saipan Legislature held a regular session and acted on the following matters:

- a. Bill No. 14 An act to provide rules and regulations to cover fires and the prevention thereof was introduced and referred to Judiciary Committee for further studies.
- b. Resolution No. 12 Relative to respectfully requesting the Naval Administrator and the Mayor to provide transportation for the students of all private schools of Saipan was introduced by the Public Works Committee and placed in the first reading file.

2. Public Works

Quonset huts are still being moved intact from former NAS Tanapag to houselots in the villages. Municipal Officials regularily check the Tanapag area to make sure all debris is cleared by the persons moving the buildings. All electric poles, lines, water pipe and other materials not needed for the new homes are being salvaged by the Municipality. The salvaged water pipe is particularily useful in helping to replace deteriorated water lines in Chalan Kanoa.

F - Municipality of Tinian

1. General

Christmas was enjoyed by all the children of Tinian when, on early Wednesday morning 23 December, the M/V Four Winds arrived in Tinian Harbor with presents contributed by personnel of Naval Supply Depot, Guam. The Four Winds entered the harbor brilliantly decorated with special strings of lights and with horns and whistles open. Later in the day the Tinian School gave a Christmas program for the community.

Water pipe has been installed in one irrigation area and water will probably be pumped by early January.

The new LST landing was completed by the EDO team from Naval Administrator Depot, Guam.

2. Public Works

The Municipal bulldozer has been clearing farming land in the Marpo Valley where the first irrigation water is due to flow.

Section V - Special Projects

A. Cattle Breeding and Development

The results of NAVADS interest in beef cattle development is becoming evident in the increased number of animals being slaughtered for local consumption. During December 11 cattle and 2 hogs were butchered at the Saipan Slaughter House for a total dressed weight of 3260 pounds.

Enclosure (7) is the quarterly statistical summary of the Naval Administration Unit Saipan cattle herds on Saipan and Tinian.

B. Cannibal Snails

The OICC Guam, Staff Entomologist and the District Agriculturist checked the 6 release sites of the cannibal snail (Euglandina Rosea) on Tinian and found the snail firmly established in 2 locations, weak in 2 locations and doubtful in the others. All snails were inactive, probably due to the early dry season.

I BORREGO

(A one-act Chamorro play in verse and song)

SCENE: The hills near Bethlehem.

TIME: The day after the birth of Christ.

Prologue:

As the story opens, a group of shepherds are sleeping in their camp. An angel appears and sings to them of the birth of a Savier in a stable in Bethlehem. She tells them to awake and go to see new born babe whose coming will relieve the sorrow of lonely men.

The shepherds awake and exit fearfully.....

Enter Elpidio who has a date to meet Silvio. Silvio is late and Elpidio cannot understand why. Elpidio wonders why he didn't go quickly to see this miracle without waiting for Silvio...But he is a little skeptical of the story of the babe and wants company. Silvio is usually never late...where can he be? (Noise offstage of approaching en arguing.) Elpidio tells audience to listen...the shepherds are coming and arguing among themselves like fools. He hides as they approach to avoid becoming involved in the argument.

Enter Shepherds arguing loudly with Silvio.

Albano sings "Quiet Shepherds"....do not argue and fight.. be calm...
..he asks Silvio to explain the trouble.

Silvio explains in song that these beasts of shepherds do not believe the story of the birth of a Messiah and they want to beat him.

Albano then verifies the story in a song and says they should all sing the praises of Mary and her child.

All sing and decide to go to Bethlehem to make adoration and see this wonderful sight.

Albano tells the shepherds how foolish they were to argue. He sends them back to secure their flocks and prepare themselves to go proper to see the babe. (All exit except Albano, Silvio, and Gironsio)

They discuss the other shepherds saying that they are really good, brave men with hearts of gold and just get exited now and then. A voice is herd offstage calling to them...

Albano and others say this is Borrego and he sounds as if he were in trouble. They call in reply giving him directions to where they are.

Borrego enters. He is a cripple and is so tired and angry that he is almost exhausted.

Shepherds ask what his trouble is...maybe they can help... Is he out of tobacco for his mouth?... Quickly, what happened?

Borrego angrily shouts NO several times and finally gets out that him bull is lost...His beautiful bull is gone!

Shepherds offer suggestions as to where the bull might be. Perhaps he wandered into a chicken pen?...Perhaps the leaves of the trees have descended and hidden him?

Borrogo becomes infuriated and says that, for the sake of his grandrother he might break somebody's head...he surely will if anyone has touched a hair of his lovely bull!

Shepherds tell him to cool off and tell them what happened.

Borrego says that, yesterday morning, when the smoke was first rising from the rancho chimneys, he was taking his bull out to a new pasture near the road to Bethlehem. A terrible thing happened there was a huge crowd on the road all hurrying to the city and they firghtened his bull. The bull ran away and Borrego could not follow on his crippled leg. As the bull went over a hill, Borrego called to him but the bull was so frightened that he had forgotten the Chamorro language. He ends his tirade with "O my dear bull that I love more than gold! Even if he is in hell I will go after him!"

Shepherds say that his misfortune shows in his eyes and obviously has sorrowed so deeply that he has eaten his shirt....But, they say forget about the bull for a while, they must all go to see the new born Saviour. Albano says that they are all very happy and that perhaps on the next day they will maybe give Borrego 2 new bulls, young and fat, to replace the lost one.

Borrego doesn't want new bulls, he wants his old one back. But he agrees to go with them for he can watch for his bull along the way.

Eloidio enters and says that he has seen the wonderful sight and has been told to inform everyone he of the wonders in Bethlehem and the many visitors to see the babe.

Albano and the others ask him to tell all about is...

Elpidio sings of how Heaven has smiled on the city and the Virgin who has delivered their Saviour.

Silvio sings that the earth and people's hearts are filled with love The song goes around the shepherds and they sing of the happy world, the birth in the stable, etc.

(During the song Borreso is unable to understand where the voices are coming from. He searches for the origins of the voices without finding them..., as the song ends...)

Borreso says that those were such sweet voices...like the pigs in the field, or the hawks on wing.

<u>Dividio</u> ignores his insults and continues speaking of the wonder of the miracle birth and the luck of the world,

Englosure (5)

- Borrego laughs in derision and says his luck has all been bad. He repeats about how his beautiful bull is missing....Now, however, he thinks that some evil person has stolen and hidden his bull.
- They warm him to be careful of such accusations...to clean his mouth and not be suspicious of other people.
- Elpidio says Borrego doesn't know how lucky he is and that the infant has been merciful to him, for he, Elpidio, has learned that the bull was found and is now safely penned in a cave and guarded by others who found him during the night.
- Borrego, somewhat ashamed of his violent accusations, disdains any thanks or display of joy. He thinks only of how his beautiful red-spotted bull must be so sad from being so long separated from Borrego. He will go kiss his bull...The infant truly heard his prayer...He will go to his bull now...can't wait.
- Elpidio stops him and tells Borrego to wait. They must go see the babe as soon as the shepherds arrive. He calls to them.
- Shepherds enter and they begin their journey, singing a song of going to Bethlehem to see the babe Jesus. (This song covers a transition in place from the hills to the stable in Bethlehem. Borrego sings the song with them but, in place of the words "Our blessed Saviour", he sings "My beautiful red-haired bull".)
- As the song ends, they have arrived at the manger and they pray in turn. All give thanks for the Saviour and adore Mary. Each says he has been a lonely man of work and pain and offers his own gift...goat's milk, taro, sweet potatoes...The rhyme of the prayers and the play upon words with the homely gifts create the humour of the scene)
- Borrego offers the final prayer, saying, "O Senora...I wish I were rich enough to offer gold and silver but all I have is this torn shirt and this staff. I give you these things. Do not think I am crazy for you can use them. I know this is a dangerous place where a fox may come for your child at any minute and you will be able to drive him off with the staff..."
- As he finished they all rise and begin their homeward journey, singing the praises of the Saviour and Mary...with Borrego still singing of his dear bull. They exit to the hills and to find Borrego's bull.
