- 1. Reference (a) requested information relative to the procedures and taxation of private scrap operations conducted in the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands administered by the Department of the Interior with comments and recommendations thereon.
- 2. The opportunity to engage in collection and sale of scrap has been offered to Trust Territory indigenes. According to the Deputy High Commissioner, little response has been received. So far authorization to engage in the scrap business has been granted only to indigenes of the Marshall Islands District, where one and possibly two trading companies have expressed such an interest. No sales or shipments have been made.
- 3. The method of operation provides for the delivery of the scrap (ferrous and non-ferrous) to the District Administrator at the District Genter. The District Administrator weighs the scrap and issues a certificate of origin. The scrap is eventually loaded on a Trust Territory vessel and shipped to Guam where it is offered on an "as is, where is" basis. For lots less than 500 long tons, shipment charges are \$12.00 per long ton. Costs for shipment of quantities in excess of this amount are determined on a "negotiated basis." A Trust Territory representative on Guam acts as agent and arranges for the sale. Shipments are to be made after 50 to 75 drums or several tons of scrap have been collected.
