1. Forwarded.
2. Specific comments applicable to the basic report are as follows:

a. Section IV.B.2. The \$17,300 (seventeen thousand, three hundred dollars) advance payment to the Northern Marianas Development Company is in addition to a \$1,000 (one thousand dollars) prior advance on this same shipment and represents full payment of the stabilized price of \$150.00 (one hundred and fifty dollars) per short ton of copra.

b. Section IV.D.4.d. The appointment of Mr. Jose I. SEMAN as District Director of Sanitation is recognition of significant achievement and is noted with pleasure.

c. Section IV.F.1.b. Equipment for the Municipality of Saipan broadcasting station is being manufactured on a volunteer basis by "ham" radio operators on Guam. It is anticipated that the radio station will be fully operational prior to Thanksgiving Day. ✓

d. Section IV.F.2.b. Tinian farmers shipped one shipment of approximately 47 (forty-seven) tons of watermelon in excess of the NSD Guam requirements for sale on the commercial markets despite advice to the contrary. Locally grown watermelon was already a glut on the commercial market and the Tinian farmers were able to realize little more than their expenses in this venture.

e. Enclosure (8). Except for approximately 40 (forty) tons of scrap and a few miscellaneous pieces of equipment, Mr. SCRO has removed from Saipan the former assets of MICRO that he purchased. ✓

1. In compliance with reference (a), the following report on Administration
of Civil Government in the Saipan District is submitted.

2. Section I - General

On 11 August Admiral HOPWOOD, Commander in Chief, U. S. Pacific Fleet and Rear Admiral Wendt, Commander Naval Forces Marianas and members of their Staffs visited Saipan. Enclosure (1) is a schedule of the day's activities.

After a lunch held at Susupe Beach, featuring locally grown food (including roast beef), and being entertained by Saipanese students in songs and dances, Admiral HOPWOOD met with members of the Legislature for a farewell address. See enclosure (2). A large group of Saipanese journeyed to the airport to bid Admiral HOPWOOD "adios" to the strains of Saipan's theme song, "My Home on Saipan".

The M/V Hope returned to Saipan On 27 August after 10 day voyage from Japan. The ship carried 87 tons of cargo on the return trip.

Juan VALENDO, a citizen of the Philippines, who had been ordered deported from the Saipan District on 13 April 1959, was finally accepted by the Philippine Government and left Saipan by air on 9 August for further transportation homeward via the MSTS Barrett.

Commander TILDEN, Officer in Charge of FLEWEACEN Guam came to Saipan on 22 August. He inspected the local weather information facilities so the reports can receive a better evaluation when received on Guam.

3. Section II - Naval Administration Unit

A - Public Works

1. The Public Works Department expended \$50,686.91 from Maintenance and Operation Funds during the month of August 1960.

4. The following training was conducted within the Public Works Department.

- a. Safety and training talks, weekly in all shop for all employees

5. A safety inspection of all Public Works areas was conducted during this month. Corrections have been initiated on all discrepancies noted.

6. Projects

The Special Project on Primary Road System repairs is 18 per cent complete.

Special Project, (5-59) for rehabilitation of BOQ was started on 18 July 1960, work is about 20 per cent complete.

Informal Contract, Special Project for construction of Saipan Intermediate School, First Increment in accordance with Bid No. 1 of Specification No. TT-2-60 has been awarded to Albert S. Camacho, building constructor on 18 May 1960. Work began 24 May. Footing and deck complete except for head deck, one end and one interior wall completed. Plumbing partially installed.

Special Project, replacement of water mains. Maui Well #1 to Isley Reservoir, to Chalan Kanoa, Coast Guard Station, Golf Course corner. Labor financed by District Revenue Funds, work is about 8 per cent complete. There will be a new tie-in at Isley Reservoir which is being completed first and at present is 65 per cent complete.

Typhoon Della did \$7800 damage to the roads, power lines, transformers, and telephone cable.

5. Section IV - Civil Administration

A - Legal and Public Safety

1. Fire Protection - There were no fires.

2. Law Enforcement - There were 28 prosecutions for traffic offenses, 26 convicted, 2 acquitted. There were 29 prosecutions for misdemeanors, all convicted. Four drivers licenses were suspended.

3. Prison - There was no parole board meeting. One prisoner was paroled by Commander Naval Forces Marianas. There were 6 prisoners on 1 August and 11 on 31 August.

4. Courts - The Saipan Court of Appeals (Trial Division) met during the week of 29 August. Four felonies were tried resulting in three conviction and confinement and one acquittal. The Judge of this Court continued conferences with the District Judge and Clerk of Courts concerning operation of the District Court.

5. Legislation - The Naval Administrator received a request for comments and recommendations concerning the Reprinted Edition of the Trust Territory Code approved on 31 December 1959 by the High Commissioner (Interior).

B - Internal Affairs

1. Agriculture

The vegetable experiments being conducted at the agricultural experiment station are in various stages of completion. The majority of the experiments accentuate the fact that the rainy season is best for green leafy crops. However, some of the new varieties developed in Hawaii show potentialities for the rainy season; the results of these experiments will provide seasonal planting information which will increase the quantity and quality of produce grown for export.

Typhoon Della and the hard rains that accompanied did an estimated 50% damage to the crops of Saipan and Tinian. The crops suffering most were the vine crops that are close to the ground. Some of the watermelon, cucumber, and cantaloupe fields were literally beaten into the ground. The banana, corn and tree crops suffered much less damage.

The lantana eradication program is progressing. The plants are cut and then burned to destroy the seed. Where this pest exists nothing else will grow.

The predaceous lady beetle released in the Oleai area for the control of a fluted scale that was attacking the breadfruit, appears to have become firmly established. A complete report can be given after the area is checked by an entomologist.

Several pieces of equipment and supplies have been received that should increase the scope of assistance to the local farmers. The two biggest pieces of equipment received were a tractor wagon and a windrower that will be used to harvest rice. The latter should encourage the production of more rice.

There were 483 white leghorn chicks hatched at the Hatchery and sold at cost to local farmers.

The Animal Husbandman vaccinated 4 cattle for warts and also supervised the vaccination of 270 chicks for New Castle disease.

There were 17 cattle and 3 hogs butchered at the Saipan Slaughter House for local consumption. The total dressed weight was 5598 pounds.

The fencing of a large area of land near Kobler Field to be used for Naval Administration Unit, Saipan cattle pasture is finished. About 45 acres of this pasture has been clipped for weed and brush control.

2. Economic Development

Mr. Frank J. Brown, Internal Affairs Officer, has been appointed to replace Mr. James B. Johnson as advisor to the Saipan Shipping Company.

Enclosure (3) is a directive from the Naval Administrator to Lt. R. E. Cotton to audit the books of the Northern Marianas Development Company.

The Northern Marianas Development Company received \$17,200 advance on 122 short tons of copra that is currently warehoused at Saipan. The advance was received from the Treasurer of the Copra Stabilization Fund.

The Trochus producers of Saipan shipped 27,000 pounds to Japan aboard the M/V Hope. It was sold for 23 $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per pound.

C - District Land Office

1. General

In connection with the meeting held in Tanapag on 29 June 1960, the Commissioner of Tanapag on 23 August submitted to the District Land Office a list of 21 applicants for garden plot leases at the "Voice of America" radio tower area.

Due to absence of a quorum, the Land Advisory Board meeting which was called for 25 August 1960 was cancelled. A meeting is scheduled for 9 September 1960.

Seven letters were written advising village and agricultural homesteaders that they had failed to meet homestead requirements. One village homestead permit was revoked for failure to meet homesteading requirements.

The Saipan Survey Team completed the following:

- a. Made a hydrographic survey of the IST beaching site in the Tinian Harbor.
- b. Made a profile, crosssection and layout of the proposed water line from Maui #1 well to the Isley Reservoir.
- c. Locate and layout homesteads that have been approved for occupancy.
- d. Locate and layout water and sewage lines and a septic tank for the new Intermediate School.
- e. Layout and set floor elevation for second increment of the new Intermediate School.

2. Alienation of Land

There was one gift of a village lot from an individual to his son. The area involved, about 702 square meters, is located on Saipan.

3. Three agricultural homesteads were surveyed and 5 were prepared for survey.

D - Section IV - Public Health and Sanitation

1. Hospital and Inpatient Care

a. There were 5 patients admitted to the Station Hospital tubercular section for diagnostic studies, evaluation and treatment. Nine patients were discharged from this section. As of 31 August 1960, 24 tubercular patients were being hospitalized for treatment. This comprises 46% of the inpatient load.

b. The average daily census was 56. There were 29 births 5 deaths and no still births. There were 101 admissions and 116 discharges from the sick list. Two patients were transferred to the U. S. Naval Hospital, Guam, M. I. The causes of the five deaths are as follows:

2. Dispensaries, Clinics, and outpatient care

- a. The satellite dispensaries on Saipan and the outpatient clinic of the Station Hospital had 4249 visits.
- b. The Tinian dispensary had 175 visits.

3. Visiting nurse and home care

- a. The visiting nurses made 325 visits to homes of bedridden patients and persons who were isolated for mumps.
- b. One hundred eighty eight cases of mumps and 4 cases of chickenpox were diagnosed and treated during the month.
- c. Sixty eight school children with positive PPD and arrested tubercular patients were contacted for X-ray and laboratory work.

4. Preventive Medicine and Sanitation

- a. Fifty three business establishments were inspected and all were found to meet sanitary standards.
- b. Eight persons received preemployment and renewal physical examinations. Those passing received health certificates.
- c. Phase II Disaster Control, Medical Supplies, are being received and stored in the hospital ready supply store. Action has been taken to safeguard these supplies and rotate the items that will deteriorate with regular stock items.
- d. A Saipanese, Mr. Jose I. Seman, was appointed District Director of Sanitation. This appointment is in conformity with the policy of the Naval Administrator of using local people in leading positions as soon as they are qualified.

5. Quarantine

- a. Twenty two ships and motor vessels were cleared for entrance and departure from the port of Saipan. All incoming and outgoing passengers were checked and passed for current immunizations and communicable disease certificates.
- b. Twenty two log flights of aircraft were met and all incoming and outgoing passengers were checked and passed for current immunizations and communicable disease certificates.

E - Education

An additional classroom has been added to the Chalan Kanoa Elementary school. This classroom will provide the additional space required due to an increase in population.

Two Intermediate School teachers returned to Saipan after completion of the summer school session at the Territorial College, Guam. These teachers are performing college work towards a baccalaureate degree, on a scholarship basis, as a part of the Saipan District's program in the specialized training and improving the professional background of its teachers. One of these teachers has returned to the Guam College for the regular fall term of school.

Forty-one students were sent to Guam for further schooling. Faculty recommendation of these scholars on an academic, as well as a social basis, was accomplished this year. A special effort is being made to select pupils who will accept responsibility as leading citizens of the Saipan District and the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.

The Department of Education Teacher's summer school ended 5 August 1960. The theme of this session was instruction in methods of teaching. This type of summer school was well received by all participating teachers and promises to have long range results in the classrooms of Saipan's Schools.

Mr. Robert L. DREW has assumed his duties as the new Principal of the Saipan Intermediate School. Mr. DREW has taught on Guam and last year was principal of the Navy Dependents school on Saipan.

Teachers have been sent to the Northern Island schools of Pagan and Agrihan. Educational supplies and building materials were shipped with the teachers. The Department of Education representative on this trip was Mr. Lowell BOOTHE, Vocational Agriculture instructor at the Intermediate School, who inspected school buildings and will make recommendations for repair and construction.

The building of a new Chalan Kanoa School flush toilet to replace the old one was commenced at the beginning of the month and about three-fourths of it was completed by the end of the month. The construction was under the direction of the school carpenter, Mr. David JONES. The municipal plumber did the plumbing work with some assistance from the school. The overall repair of the porch of one of the two wings at the Chalan Kanoa School was started at the latter part of the month and is nearing completion.

The Tinian Public Elementary School has made improvements as follows:

1. Two fluorescent lights were installed in each classroom and auditorium.
2. Floors have been repaired in the classrooms.
3. The furniture has been repainted.
4. All equipment and books have been checked.
5. A new lawn mower has been purchased.
6. The toilets have been completely renovated.
7. Plans for better recreational facilities have been discussed.

F -- Municipalities

1. Saipan

a. General

A Trust Territory Economic Fair was held on Guam at the Trust Territory Headquarters, for a period of one week the 22nd of August. Among the Saipanese exhibits were locally grown and processed tapioca starch, coconut oil, coffee. Handicraft products were bull carts, coconut faces, baskets and hats made of pandanus leaves. Beautiful oil paintings also added a delightful showing at the exhibition. //

Most of the articles sent to Guam were offered for sale on the last day and orders were taken for items that were displayed in small quantity.

b. Public Works

The proposed Municipality of Saipan broadcasting station is ready for use as soon as the proper equipment arrives. A sound-proof room has been prepared and two 70 feet poles have been erected. //

Four roads, of about 2,000 feet in length, were opened in Susupe Village and are now in wide use. One road in Tanapag of about 300 feet was also opened. Three roads were opened in the Garapan area running from the upper highway (W-2) to the Beach Road. The combined total of these roads are about 1500 feet.

The Bureau of yards and docks awarded a demolition contract to the Municipality of Saipan for 83 quonsets in the old BFM Compound. The contract was effective 1 September and is to be completed by 31 December. The material salvaged from these buildings will be used to build homes for people of Saipan.

c. Legislation

A special session of the Legislature was held on 4 August to discuss the farewell visit to Saipan of Admiral HOPWOOD. A resolution was unanimously passed for presenting Admiral HOPWOOD a written commendation and thanking him for his great personal, as well as official, interest in Saipan.

A regular session of the Legislature was held on 24 August, the main topic of discussion being the possibilities of improving Saipan's economy. A special committee to study this matter was appointed composed of the following members:

The special committee mentioned above met with the Naval Administrator, Commander P. W. BRIDWELL, on 30 August at the Legislature Hall to discuss methods of implementing their plans.

2. Tinian

a. General

A proposal to have the Home Economics teacher of the Saipan Intermediate School visit Tinian for home-canning demonstrations was discussed with the Tinianese. The idea received a warm reception and it is estimated that at least 40 women would attend.

The Saipan Station Hospital has promised an early visit to Tinian by the dentist.

b. Agriculture

Heavy rains during the month caused extensive damage to most growing crops.

A farmers meeting was held for the purpose of stressing the need of not overproducing easily grown crops such as watermelon, tomatoe, cantaloupe and cucumbers but do more diversified farming. Much money has been lost recently by not being able to market produce in excess of NSD Guam requirements. It was decided that unless strong evidence was available to the farmers that their excess produce could be sold, they would no longer ship to commercial markets on Guam.

Other economical problems were discussed such as the possibilities of increasing the Tinian swine and cattle herds in anticipation of a new slaughter house being built, and the expanding of the small fishing fleet.

Two surplus heifers from the USN cattle herd were sold to local farmers. Privately owned cattle are now estimated at 149 head.

c. Public Works

A 2500 gallon water tank as been mounted on foundations and connected to the Naval Administration Unit, Tinian, water line. The foundation of the 5000 gallon water tank is of wood and fast deteriorating and will be replaced by steel beams.
