

2. Of particular concern to the Navy is the question of "Divided Administration". The writer was asked to review this subject: Executive Orders of 10 November 1952 and 17 July 1953 which transferred the Saipan District (except for the island of Rota) were the starting point; meetings held by representatives of all interested Departments were outlined, climaxed by an exchange of

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correspondence in the fail of 1959 between the Secretary of the Interior and the Under Secretary of the Navy in which Mr. Santa advised Secretary Seaton (OP-09825 Serial 3631F0982 of 17 Fee suber 1959) that "... the Navy Department is prepared to transfer administrative responsibility for the Saigan District to the Department of the Interior." Following an inspection of the facilities on Saigan by the former missioner, Interior representatives informed representatives in OPNAY that they were not propared to assume this resulting bility. Consequently, no farther action was taken by Mayy.

- 3. Representatives from the other Governmental Department stated that they would prefer to have the status que had tained meder Navy. They could, and would, continue continue continue and under Teterior's administration of the Saipan District provided NTTU was retained with necessary details handled at Guara (COMMANMARIANAS).
- d. Covered in my memorandum of 5 June) that the Mark should assume more responsibility in administering the whole Trust Territory. His proposal is that the Navy take ever logistic support of the entire Trust Territory both surface. I asked if he had in mind a joint administration between Navy and Interior and if so that this had been in the past. Article 1, Logistics, of the Transfer Agrees the Government of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islandshall become independent of Navy installations as rapidly practicable."

The aircraft used by the High Commissioner, flown under contract with PANAN, are old and should be replaced. Interior recently tried to do this but were unsuccessful. The AML's turned over to Interior in 1951 are reported to be in peon operating condition. Logistic support in the Trust Territory is the most difficult part of the administration of the expen. It is a well known fact that Interior has been having difficulty in keeping the supply lines open in the Marshalls and Crambook Secretary Carver stated that they were not going to live were the mistakes that had been made in the past but rather would request additional Navy support in the fields of logistic support and possibly communications. I mentioned that the time a recommendation had been made to have the medical gard turned over to the U. S. Public Health Service. In Sum, town High Commissioner, Deputy High Commissioner, Legal, Economics, Education and Scientific fields would be Interior employees and Logistics and possibly Communications would be handled by the Navy.

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5. A there is a strong possibility that a letter may come to LEGHAY from SECINTERIOR recommending this merging of administrative chores in the near future, I have prepared enclosure (2) for your consideration.

6. Other items on the Agenda deal principally with Interior and State. Mr. Bingham stated that he would answer question a dealing with political and U. S. policy while ones concernative matters would be answered by Mr. Nucker or for Goding - the Special U. S. Representatives.
