# SAYRE IS APPOINTED TO TRUSTEE COUNCIL

## NAMED TO U. N. POST

His Selection for U. N. Post Is Sent to Senate With List of Recess Nominations

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8—President Truman sent to the Senate today a long list of nominations. Some were new, and the others formalized appointments he had announced during the congressional recess.

There was no immediate evidence of opposition to the leading nominees. A spokesman at the Republican National Headquarters said that he had not heard of moves to block any of the names which had come to his attention.

A new appointment was that of Francis B. Sayre of this city as United States representative on the United Nations Trusteeship Council. Mr. Sayre, a lawyer and former professor, has been active in diplomacy for more than twenty years.

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He is a former assistant Secretary of State and formerly served as High Commissioner of the Philippines. His most recent post has been that of diplomatic adviser to the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration.

Other nominations submitted to Congress included:

- O. Max Gardner, former Under-Secretary of the Treasury, to be Ambassador to Great Britain.
- A. Lee M. Wiggins, to succeed Mr. Gardner in the Treasury post.
- W. Averell Harriman, to be Secretary of Commerce.
- Vice Admiral Lewis E. Denfeld, to the rank of full admiral for the period of his service as Chief of Naval Personnel.
- Carroll Miller, to a new term on the Interstate Commerce Commission, expiring Dec. 31, 1953.
- Richard F. Mitchell, to fill the remainder of the term of Claude R. Porter, expiring Dec. 31, 1949.
- Gordon R. Clapp, to succeed David E. Lillenthal as Chairman of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

- Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, member of the Human Rights Commission of the U. N. Economic and Social Council, for a four-year term.
- Edward F. Bartelt, member of the U. N. Economic and Social Council's Fiscal Commission, two years.
- Philip M. Hauser, member of the U. N. Economic and Social Council's Population Commission, two years.
- Stuart A. Rice, member of the U. N. Economic and Social Council's Statistical Commission, two years.
