Mr. Cordon submitted the following concurrent resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Public Lands

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Whereas the President, on behalf of the United States, pursuant to authority contained in Public Law 204 of the first session of the Eightieth Congress, has approved an agreement between the Security Council of the United Nations and the United States of America pursuant to which the United States has become the administering authority for the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, heretofore known as the Japanese Mandated Islands of the Pacific; and

Whereas it is the responsibility of the Congress of the United States to provide a permanent government for the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands; and

Whereas the problem of administration of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands is interrelated to the administration of Guam, American Samoa, Wake Island, and other United States island possessions in the Pacific Ocean: Therefore be it

1	Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives
2	concurring), That there is hereby established a joint con-
3	gressional committee to be composed of three members who
4	are members of the Committee on Public Lands of the
5	Senate, to be appointed by the President pro tempore of
6	the Senate, and three members who are members of the
7	Committee on Public Lands of the House of Representa-
8	tives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of
9	Representatives. The committee shall select a chairman
10	and a vice chairman from among its members.
11	SEC. 2. The committee shall make a thorough study and
12	investigation of the islands, groups of islands, and other areas
13	included within the Trust Territory of the Pacific, and all
14	other islands, groups of islands, and other areas in the
1 5	Pacific which are possessions of, or subject to the authority
16	of, the United States, including study and investigation of-
17	(a) the peoples, customs, laws, economies, re-
18	sources, and governments of such areas;
19	(b) the interrelation, and the natural or appropriate
20	integration, of such areas;
21	(c) the interrelation of the security of such areas
22	and the security of the United States;
23	(d) measures designed to advance the security and
24	well-being of the peoples and economies of such areas
25	\mathbf{and}

(e) such other matters relating to such areas as the 1 committee may deem appropriate. 2 SEC. 3. The committee shall complete its study and in-3 vestigation as expeditiously as possible, and shall forthwith 4 thereafter report to the Committee on Public Lands of the Senate and the Committee on Public Lands of the House 6 of Representatives the results thereof, recommending such 7 organic and other legislation as may be necessary to provide 8 for the civil government of such areas, and to assure to the peoples of such areas justice, peace, and tranquillity, 10 a voice in their civic affairs and government, the develop-11 ment of their economies and the protection of their civil 12 rights, all with due regard to the established customs of such peoples. 14 SEC. 4. For the purposes of this concurrent resolution, 15 the committee, or any duly authorized subcommittee thereof, 16 is authorized to hold such hearings, to sit and act at such 17 times and places during the sessions, recesses, and adjourned 18 periods of the Eightieth Congress, to employ such con-19 sultants, specialists, clerks and other assistants, to travel, 20 and authorize its assistants to travel, freely throughout such 21 areas and such other places, to utilize such transportation, 22 housing, and other facilities as the Army, Navy, Marine 23 Corps, Coast Guard, and Air Force may make available, 24

to require by subpena or otherwise the attendance of such

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1 witnesses and the production of such correspondence, books,

2 papers, and documents, to administer such oaths, to take

3 such testimony, and to make such expenditures, as it deems

4 advisable. The cost of stenographic services to report such

5 hearings shall not be in excess of 25 cents per hundred

6 words. The expenses of the committee, which shall not

7 exceed \$50,000, shall be paid one-half from the contingent

8 fund of the Senate and one-half from the contingent

9 fund of the House of Representatives, upon vouchers ap-

10 proved by the chairman or vice chairman. Disbursements

11 to pay such expenses shall be made by the Secretary of the

12 Senate out of the contingent fund of the Senate, such con-

13 tingent fund to be reimbursed from the contingent fund of

14 the House of Representatives in the amount of one-half of

15 disbursements so made.
