Subject: Appointment of civilian High Commissioner for the Trust Territory and civilian Governor of American Samoa.

I strongly recommend that the Department take immediate steps to nominate to the President, through the Secretary of the Navy, candidates for High Commissioner for the Trust Territory and Governor of American Samoa. According to the Navy-Interior memoranda of understanding which the President approved, these appointments should be made on or about July 1, 1950. Further delay will raise doubts as to Interior's readiness to assume responsibility for these islands as scheduled and will make the transfer task more difficult. The High Commissioner, in particular, will need a full year to work out transportation and other problems involved in the transfer of the Trust Territory.

The following candidates are recommended for your consideration:

High Commissioner

Knowles A. Ryerson, Dean of the California College of Agriculture and Chairman of the Pacific Science Board.

Claude A. Buss, Professor, Stanford University, and former Executive Assistant to the U. S. High Commissioner to the Philippines.

James A. McConnell, Civil Engineer on loan from State Department to Interior Point IV Program; formerly with OFIC in Micronesia and Philippines and Regional Director of FWA in New England.

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Governor of American Samoa

Oren E. Long, Secretary of Hawaii and former Superintendent of Schools in Hawaii.

William Zimmerman, Jr., Associate Director, Bureau of Land Management, Interior Department; former Assistant Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Felix Keesing, Senior U. S. Commissioner on the South Pacific Commission and Professor of Anthropology at Stanford University.

Wesley C. Clark, Acting Head of the Placement Bureau, Syracuse University; formerly Assistant to Secretary Ickes.

Gilbert Lyle Beasley, Commissioner for Special Services, Federal Security Agency; formerly Director, Civil Service Assembly and Executive Secretary, War Production Board.

Lawrence W. Gramer, Secretary General of the Caribbean Commission; former Governor of the Virgin Islands.

Biographical sketches of these candidates are attached. With your concurrence, we will consult them in the order listed to ascertain their willingness to accept an appointment if offered. If Ryerson or Bass accepts, Mr. McConnell, who is recommended by Congressman McCormack of Massachusetts, would be available for the position of Deputy High Commissioner. The position of Lieutenant Governor or Government Secretary of American Samoa is being left open as agreed for John Nichols; if he is not interested, it is suggested that Gordon Macgregor, Social Economist in the Pacific Branch of this Division, be considered for the post.
