

Secretary's Itinerary Is Announced

Governor Lowe announced yesterday that Secretary Seaton and his official party will arrive in Guam from Truk late Saturday afternoon, August 24, 1957. Sunday will be spent touring the island and in recreational activities.

MONDAY LUNCHEON

On Monday, August 26, the Legislature, the Island Commissioners, and the Judiciary will have a luncheon in Secretary Seaton's honor, followed by discussions of local problems. There will be a meeting with department heads, and in the evening there will be a reception given jointly by the Governor and the High Commissioner of the Trust Territory at Government House.

C-OF-C DINNER

Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock a.m. the party will leave to visit other Trust Territory Islands and will return to Guam late Friday afternoon, August 30, 1957.

On Saturday there will be a military luncheon to discuss military security and related economic problems. That evening the Chamber of Commerce will hold a dinner in honor of the secretary. The next morning the party will leave Guam at 9 o'clock a.m. for Hawaii.

Samoa Solons Greet Seaton, Ask For Aid

PAGO PAGO, Aug. 18 (P)—The American Samoa legislature met in joint session yesterday to greet Fred A. Seaton, U.S. secretary of the Interior, who is touring U.S. Pacific territories.

House Speaker Aifili Lauvao asked for more legislative power and for loans to encourage economic development of better roads, power development, and schools.

Secretary Seaton said he would study problems in Samoa and would reply from Washington.

Legislature Plans Meet With Seaton

The Legislature plans to hold an open conference with Interior Secretary Fred Seaton next Monday in the legislative hall after a scheduled 12 o'clock luncheon that day, Speaker Antonio B. Won-Pat told the Daily News yesterday.

MORE APPROPRIATE

Won-Pat said the luncheon will be held at the Panciteria in Tamuning, and in order to accommodate persons who may wish to listen to the discussions, it was felt the legislative hall would be the appropriate place for the meeting.

He added, however, that he had learned Seaton has expressed his preference to hold the meeting at the Panciteria immediately following the luncheon. He also said the Legislature will invite the district commissioners who also are elected officials, to the meeting.

TO ADDRESS CHAMBER

Seaton held a similar conference with the Samoan legislature last week. He is expected to arrive here next Saturday for a three-day tour, and then return again on August 31. He is scheduled to address the Guam Chamber of Commerce on that date.
