GUAM PROFESSOR SURVEYS TRUST TERRITORY'S NURSING NEEDS

SAIPAN, MARIANA ISLANDS, TRUST TERRITORY OF THE PACIFIC ISLANDS
(FEBRUARY 2)...Mrs. Mabel Claire R. Norman, Chairman, Division of Nursing Education, College of Guam, arrived in Saipan Monday to become acquainted with the nursing needs of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.

Mrs. Norman said she plans to start an Associate Degree Nursing program at the College of Guam. Mrs. Norman, who is an associate professor, and Dr. Luke A. Howe, Acting Director of Public Health for the Trust Territory, feel the program will attract a number of applications from Trust Territory citizens.

The proposed course covers four semesters and two summer sessions. Clinical facilities at both Guam Memorial Hospital and the U. S. Naval Hospital will be used. Graduates will earn Associate in Arts degrees, and will take the same licensing examination given to nurses on the mainland to become registered nurses.

Mrs. Norman will return to Guam on the Thursday plane.

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MICRONESIAN WOMEN TO STUDY MANAGEMENT OF BEAUTY AND BARBER SHOPS

The six month course, which will be held in Honolulu, is sponsored by the Institute for Technical Interchange of the East-West Center, University of Hawaii, and will begin February 16, 1966.

The objectives of the course are to teach the participants to:

1. Improve their own technical skills in caring for hair, nails, and skin;
2. Learn through actually doing the work themselves;

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3. Understand the vital need for sanitary practices;
4. Gain experience in shop management;
5. Become familiar with essential equipment--its operation,
care and maintenance;
6. Develop good public relations and improve their own personality;
7. Ways to train others.

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
