Dear Congressman Hays:

I am writing you to vigorously protest your remarks about Micronesia. Your suggestion to "sink" Micronesia is a gross insult and thoughtlessly racist. Had any part of the United States requested such just compensation, particularly your own constituency, I am sure your attitude would not be so cavalier.

The people of Micronesia have suffered and lost a great deal at the hands of the Americans, both because of the battles wages on their islands and the twenty-five years of American domination. Callousness and thoughtlessness such as yours have contributed to a good deal of sinking in Micronesia already.

Travel to Micronesia, Congressman Hays. Experience for yourself the discomfort and shame of those islands that you would so casually destroy. Witness the beautiful potential of the Micronesian and his land going to waste and pollution through neglect and ineptness.

Twenty-five million dollars is a pittance. It cannot buy back the lives lost nor pay for the destruction of the Micronesian cultures so deeply rooted in their precious land. It can never compensate for the radicalization of a gentle and trusting people.

What do you know of Micronesia? Do you know about the displaced people of Kili, who for over twenty years languished on an isolated island unreachable for most of the year because of rough seas. They are to return to their home island, Bikini, but they have suffered and their losses cannot be monitarily wiped away.

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What do you know of the people of Ujelang? They vainly live for the return of their home atoll, Eniwetok. They have survived for so many years on a rat-infested, barren and isolated rock unable to sustain any kind of agriculture. Their compensation for the "temporary" loss of their home was \$175,000, \$150,000 of which was invested for them by the U. S. Government in United States Bonds at 3%. The income from this provided them with an average allowance of \$1.67 per person per year. Yet, they have rejected offers of additional money. They want their home returned to them and a decent way of life.

What, do you know of the people of Rongelap who were showered with radioactive fallout from a Bikini test bomb. These Marshallese people were compensated with a few hundred thousand dollars, while the crew of the Lucky Dragon, a Japanese fishing boat illegally fishing in Micronesian waters, received several million. These islanders have been assured an earlier death because of this contamination, and they believe, as do many Micronesians, that they were purposefully used a guinea pigs for atomic testing.

What do you know, Congressman, about Pingelap eye disease; Micronesian infant mortality rates of up to 50%; epidemic parasites, impetigo, hepatitus, gastroenteritus, veneral disease; juvenile delinquency rates of high school graduates with fourth-grade educations; rising suicide rates? How would you pay off these miseries.

As an American, I am deeply ashamed. I urge you to retract your remarks, and to offer your profoundest apologies to the good people you have scorned. The United States owes Micronesia more than a few million dollars. Rather than sink these precious islands, America owes them our best efforts to elevate Micronesia to a proud and sovereign nation.
