Dear President Nixon:

At this crucial phase in Micronesia's development toward self-government, we would like to bring to your attention a matter which we feel deserves serious and immediate attention by the United States of America as Administering Authority of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.

The matter to which we refer is the selection of the highest officials in the executive and judicial branches of the Trust Territory Government. We believe that in consideration of the past progress made in our political development and in view of the exegeses of such future development that it has now become essential—if not mandatory—to select qualified Micronesian citizens in such high positions, and to solicit the advice of the legislative branch of the Trust Territory Government regarding such selections.

The Congress of Micronesia, under the authority vested in it by Public Law No. 4C-48, and as amended by Public Law 4C-91, may now render to the executive branch its "Advice and Consent" on major appointments of the High Commissioner including all Directors of their departments and their deputies, and all District Administrators and their deputies. We would also respectfully refer you to House Joint Resolution No. 77, adopted during the Second Regular Session of the Fourth Congress of Micronesia, which requests that the legislative branch play a greater part in the selection of the High Commissioner, the Deputy High Commissioner and the Chief and Associate Justices of the Trust Territory.

In consideration of the past responsible actions of the Congress in this regard, the availability of qualified

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Micronesian administrators, the fact that the executive branch of the U.S. Government may soon be reorganized and particularly in consideration of the mandates of the agreement between the United States and the United Nations regarding the former Japanese mandated islands, we would thus now like to respectfully request that the United States Government give serious consideration to appointing Micronesian citizens to the positions of High Commissioner, Deputy High Commissioner and the Chief and Associate Justices of the Trust Territory Government. In addition, we believe that the legislative branch of the Government should be involved either directly, through advice and consent, or at a minimum, through informal advice and recommendation relative to such appointments. We are thoroughly convinced of the equity of the democratic process under which Micronesia has been governed by the United States during the past quarter of a century. We are also aware of the many examples in the history of the governments of the nations of the world, including that of the United States of America, where rule imposed by those other than the people being governed is not only onerous, but inequitable to the governed. The continuance of such imposed administration in the past has more often than not led to resentment, revolt, and revolution. We do not espouse such disturbing courses, neither do we contemplate their emergence relative to the administration of the Trust Territory. We feel certain that the people of Micronesia fully embrace the principles of the democratic processes to resolve whatever obstacles or encumbrances which many constrain them in reaching the goals of self-government and self-determination. We say this because we consider it self-evident the past political progress made by the people of Micronesia through the orderly and lawful processes of petitions, resolutions, and laws. We thus see the appointment--and eventual election--of Micronesians to these positions as logical and inevitable, in consonance with the principles of democracy and the mandates of the Trusteeship Agreement. We might also note that our advocacy of appointment of Micronesians is not specifically linked to dissatisfaction with the present American administrators, but rather to the sure knowledge that Micronesia must be administered by Micronesians -- sooner, rather than later -- and that an appointed official, no matter how sincere and involved he may be, cannot have the same acuity of feeling for a country that a person does who is born, lives and dies in that country.

In short, Mr. President, we believe it is time for Micronesia to take another important step forward toward self-government. We assert this in the positive sense of the words of the great British statesman David Lloyd George: "Liberty is not merely a privilege to be conferred; it is a habit to be acquired."
