SUBJECT:

Bipartisan Leadership Briefing on the Marianas Agreement

On March 13th, I convened a "mini-LIG" meeting to permit Ambassador Williams to brief us on the progress of the Marianas Commonwealth Agreement and prospects for its acceptance by the Congress.

The next step in the approval process is a late June U.N. observed plebiscite in the Marianas where the people will decide whether to accept or reject the Covenant. If they accept it, the Covenant then goes to both Houses of the U.S. Congress for approval. The President on March 19 told the two Marianas representatives he would support it with Congress.

Throughout the negotiations Ambassador Williams consulted closely with the leaders in the Senate and House Interior Committees, under whose jurisdiction approval of the Covenant falls.

On White House instructions, and at the request of the Committee Chairmen, however, substantive contacts on the negotiations were limited to these two committees, with the appropriation subcommittees informed as necessary. Other individual members of the Congress were brought in only to the extent they asked questions or expressed an interest.

Since signature of the Covenant, opposition to it has surfaced in the Senate in the form of an attack led by Gary Hart on \$1.5 million requested for transitional studies in the Marianas. The final vote on the issue was 47 to 39 in favor.

In the House Territorial and Insular Affairs Subcommittee, Chairman Burton is favorably inclined towards the Covenant, but attacks along the same line as Hart's can still be expected. A hard push may thus be necessary in both Houses to get approval.

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Up to this time the leadership in neither House has been briefed on what is involved. Such a briefing by Ambassador Williams during the President's next leadership meeting would be highly desirable as an initial step in a wider Congressional campaign. Any Congressional expressions of support that might be stimulated by such a meeting would, of course, be very helpful in the June plebiscite.

After two years of negotiations, a Covenant was signed in February which, when approved by Congress, will provide Commonwealth status for the Northern Marianas Islands, the first addition to U.S. territory since 1917. A copy of the Agreement was presented to the President on March 19 when he met with two Marianas representatives.

The next step in the approval process is a late June U.N. observed plebiscite in the Marianas where the people will decide whether to accept or reject the Covenant. If they accept it, the Covenant then goes to both Houses of the U.S. Congress for approval. The President on March 19 said he would support it with Congress.

Throughout the negotiations Ambassador Haydn Williams, the President's personal representative for micronesian status negotiations, consulted closely with the leaders in the Senate and House Interior Committees, under whose jurisdiction approval of the Covenant falls.

On White House instructions, and at the request of the Committee Chairmen, however, substantive contacts on the negotiations were limited to these two committees, with the appropriation subcommittees informed as necessary. Other individual members of the Congress were brought in only to the extent they asked questions or expressed an interest.

Since signature of the Covenant, opposition to it has surfaced in the Senate in the form of an attack led by Gary Hart on \$1.5 million requested for transitional studies in the Marianas. The final vote on the issue was 47 to 39 in favor.

Therefore, we are requesting that a briefing by Ambassador Williams be included on the agends for an early Leadership meeting. Of course, the Chairmen and ranking minority members or the House and Senate Interior Committees should be invited to the meeting.

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
