BACKGROUND:

Your receiving these two Marianas political leaders would be an effective demonstration of the high importance we attach to our new Commonwealth Agreement with the Mariana Islands. The Agreement will be voted on in

a plebiscite on June 17. The Mariana Islands, one of the six districts in the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, three years ago formally opted for a closer relationship with the U.S. than that desired by the other five districts. If the Agreement is approved by the plebiscite, the Mariana Islands, of which Guam is geographically a part, will become the first new U.S. territorial acquisition since 1971 when we acquired the Virgin Islands.

We expect the plebiscite to be approved, but we cannot take this outcome for granted. A Carolinian minority in the Marianas is vigorously opposing the Commonwealth Agreement, and there is also some opposition in the United States Senate and in the United Nations.

President Santos and Senator Borja have long been identified as two of the strongest supporters of a commonwealth arrangement with the U.S. President Santos is Vice Chairman of the Marianas Political Status Commission, which negotiated the Agreement with us, and Senator Borja is a former member of that body. Your meeting with them would boost the chances for a strong positive majority vote in the plebiscite.
